The College has been providing excellent and affordable educational opportunities to Union County residents for more than 90 years, transforming our community, one student at a time.

- 1933: Union County Junior
 College opens on
 October 16 as an
 "emergency junior
 college" with evening
 classes at Abraham
 Clark High School

- 1934: Dr. Hubert Banks
 Huntley becomes the
 first chief administrator
 of Union County
 Junior College.
- **1935:** Dr. Charles G. Cole succeeds Dean Huntley and is considered the first "President."
- **1936:** Union County Junior College is established as a non-profit institution governed by a Board of Trustees
- **1936:** The College changes its name to Union Junior College (UJC).
- 1940: Basketball is the only varsity sport at UCNJ. The '39/'40 girl's basketball squa captures first place in the "Powderpuff League." This is the first championship for a UJC Team.
- 1941: The College begins offering day courses or Sept. 1 and continues to use the laboratories at Abraham Clark High School.

- 1942: UJC is housed at Grant School, called the "Old Lady of Holly Street," and rents the space from the Cranford Board of Education.
- 1944: To better accommodate returning veterans from WWII, the College creates a Veterans Study Cente and changes the academic year from two semesters to one divided into four quarters.
- **1944:** Dr. Kenneth Campbell MacKay succeeds Dr. Cole as president.
- 1948: For less than \$56,000, the Board of Trustees authorizes the purchas of 56 acres from the Dreyer family in Cranford. A decade later it becomes the home of the Cranford Campus.
- 1949: Elizabeth General
 Hospital begins its

- 1982: Union College merges with the Union County Technical Institute and Union County College is established on Aug. 17.
- **1983:** Dr. Derek N. Nunney is named president.
- **1990:** Dr. Thomas H. Brown becomes president.
- **1991:** The Campus Center, now known as the Victor M. Richel Student Commons, opens on the Cranford Campus.
- 1992: The College purchases the Courier News Building in Plainfield and begins offering courses in the newly renovated two-story building.

his year's annual report reflects the transformative opportunities our students experience at UCNJ, New Jersey's Community College. UCNJ Student Receives JKCF Transfer Scholarship

Student scholar Odudu Ekpenyong, of Springfield, is one of 90 students nationwide to receive the prestigious Jack Kent Cooke Foundation Undergraduate Transfer Scholarship. As a finalist, Mr. Ekpenyong will receive up to \$55,000 a year to complete his bachelor's degree at a four-year institution.

Mr. Ekpenyong graduated from UCNJ in spring 2025 with a computer

science degree. During his time at the College, he served as Vice President of Public Relations for the Iota Xi Chapter of Phi Theta Kappa (PTK) honor society, Vice President of the Entrepreneurs Club, was a member of the Cybersecurity Club, a tutor at the Academic Learning Center (ALC), and a Union Honors scholar.

He was also selected as a 2024 Coca-Cola Leaders of Promise Scholar and

was part of the All-NJ State Academic Team in recognition of his scholarly achievements. He plans to pursue a bachelor's degree in aviation science with a concentration in professional piloting at Tuskegee University, with aspirations of becoming an airline captain and mentoring underrepresented pilots.

This year's selection process drew more than 1,600 applications from

community colleges across the nation. UCNJ had two additional semifinalists for the scholarship, Faris Areigat and Samir Perez. These students were PTK scholars, tutors at UCNJ's ALC, and were active members of student organizations during their time at UCNJ.





Margolies Transfer Scholarship Recipients

Star Scholars Receive Life Changing Scholarship

Thanks to the continued generosity of the Margolies family, the Margolies Family Transfer Scholarship was awarded once again to two exemplary UCNJ students, supporting them as they transfer to selective institutions.

This year's recipients of the Margolies Family Transfer Scholarship are UCNJ Class of 2025 graduates Lucas Dasilva and Rachel Sweet. Each student will receive up to \$25,000 per year for the next two years to support their bachelor's degree attainment.

Mr. DaSilva earned his degree in computer science and will be transferring to Stevens Institute of Technology. Ms. Sweet earned her associate degree in psychology and will be continuing her studies at Swarthmore College. Both students were part of the Union Honors program and were peer tutors in the ALC, as well as being a member of other clubs and organizations at the College.




Spring Commencement




Stock Market Stars: UCNJ Visits NASDAQ




The UCNJ graduation rate has more than quintupled. Additionally, the College went from having the lowest graduation rate in NJ to exceeding both the state and national average.

Ascending Academia



Every eight years, institutions in the region complete a selfstudy and undergo a peer review process to renew their accreditation from the Middle States Commission on Higher Education (MSCHE). This year, the College was visited by a team of peer reviewers from MSCHE to evaluate how UCNJ meets the standards for accreditation. MSCHE is a non-governmental organization that accredits over 500 institutions of higher education and is recognized by the United States Department of Education. The Commission's accreditation process ensures institutional accountability, selfappraisal, improvement, and innovation through peer review and the rigorous application of standards within the context of institutional mission.

The preparation for this visit was led by the College's self-study tri-chairs: Vice President for Academic Affairs Dr. Sara Lacagnino, Associate Vice President for Academic Affairs and Dean of Humanities Dr. Melissa Sande, and Associate Professor of Business Marc Postiglione. More than 140 UCNJ faculty and staff members participated in the self-study process and met with members of the team for the MSCHE visit. At the conclusion of their visit, the Middle States visiting team provided their oral exit report in the Roy Smith Theater. The College's accreditation was reaffirmed by MSCHE. The next MSCHE site visit is expected in 2032-33.

For the past four decades, UCNJ's Academic Learning Center (ALC) has been a vital resource providing students with free peerto-peer tutoring across the Cranford, Elizabeth, Plainfield, and Virtual

Campuses. Employing more than 50 tutors annually, ALC tutors have achieved high academic success in their given tutoring field. Tutors offer extra support to their fellow students,

gaining a deeper understanding of their coursework, and fostering mentorship between the peer tutor and the student receiving help.



Igniting Innovation

UCNJ's 3rd Annual Pitch competition brought the entrepreneurial spirit as students competed to earn funding to advance their business ideas.

Thanks to the support of the Union County College Foundation, UCNJ students had the opportunity to develop, present, and fund their



business ideas. To prepare participants with the skills needed to transform their concepts into a compelling pitch and business, the Director of the College's Business Center provided intensive, hands-on workshops. Students were also mentored by Foundation **Board Member Adam** Bell, CEO of Rotuba Extruders, Inc. and Pen Company of America. The winning pitches were selected by a panel of judges in the business field, and the winners were:

- Third place: Juan Acosta's Active Lightening, Active Wear & Workouts Plans



Rise of the Archives

This past year, the UCNJ Archives received a grant from the New Jersey Historical Commission for the project "Student Voices at College." The initiative supported the ongoing research of student interns into civic discourse at the College from the late 1960s through the 1980s, focusing on topics such as race, women's rights, the early gay rights movement and AIDS crisis, and the Vietnam War. Students conducted their research under the guidance of Associate Professor in History Dr. Michele Rotunda with support from Senior Professor in History Dr. Phillip Papas, History Academic Specialist Joseph Margiotta, and Librarian Emma Trevena.

As part of the project, students conducted more than a dozen oral history interviews with alumni and presented their findings at several academic conferences, including the Middle States Commission on Higher Education, the American Historical Association, and the New Jersey History and Historic Preservation Conference.

The project culminated in a public exhibit at UCNJ. Attendees included alumni dating back to the 1960s, former interns, and members of the College community. The event featured student research posters, archival displays of student newspapers, and the unveiling of the Archives' updated website: www.archives1933. wordpress.com.



Students Shine at Research Days

Each year, Union Honors students create research projects and present them to the College community. Union Honors is for high achieving, academically motivated students who attend and graduate from UCNJ, who will then transfer to a four-year institution. This year, more than 50 honors students presented their work, which included research on airbag technology, fast fashion, the AIDS crisis, and more. These student-scholars showcased their findings and answered questions from attendees.

STEM students presented their research at UCNJ's annual Research Day. More than 100 students displayed their research projects through poster presentation. Before the posters were presented, Drs. Afshin Ghavami and Mark Varney from Psychogenics addressed the crowd of students and discussed their careers. They emphasized that research can positively impact millions of lives, and researchers shape the future of medicine.





Interstellar Collaboration **Receives STEM Award**

The New Jersey STEM Pathways Network recognized UCNJ's Vertical Farm Hydroponic STEM-Business Project with the 2025 STEM Collaboration of the Year Award. Dr. Mohamed Mohamed, Director of Student Research & Science Laboratories and Dr. Donovan Smalls, Director of the Business Center, were recognized for their novel collaboration.

Under this innovative system, plants grow vertically indoors at UCNJ using synthetic material instead of soil. The plants can be harvested every six

weeks. STEM students observe and document plant behavior, making the necessary adjustments needed to help the plants grow and thrive. Students are tasked with creating detailed reports and developing a business plan that enables this project to become a successful farming business. The initiative partners STEM and business students, who are mentored, to create a successful agricultural business that also helps the College community.

applying to colleges, offered advice on gaining admission into selective institutions, provided insight on scholarships and the financial aid process, and offered encouragement on next steps.







From Owl Nation to Tiger Territory

Eight UCNJ students were selected to participate in Princeton
University's Transfer Scholars Initiative summer program. This highly
selective program offers an exceptional opportunity for students to take
courses at Princeton at no cost to them. The eight scholars enrolled in a
full-time, eight-week academic curriculum, taking two full credit Princeton
courses. Outside of class, students connected with Princeton faculty,
students, and receive transfer success programing to guide them after
earning an associate degree at UCNJ. Transfer Scholars received a stipend
to cover expenses, including travel, and live on campus.

American Revolution Exhibit Celebrates New Jersey History

To celebrate the 250th anniversary of New Jersey's role in the American Revolution, the College's Social Sciences, Business, and History Division hosted a series of events across the campuses. It was commemorated

with Revolutionary
War re-enactments,
teaching students how
to write with invisible
ink, a Declaration
of Independence
guessing game, and
an exhibit featuring
the trees of the
American Revolution.
Students also had
the opportunity to
view a presentation of



artifacts from the American Revolutionary War, including a gilt British officer's gorget, a 1782 Washington Peace Medallion, and a copper American Comitia medal commemorating John Howard Eager's victory at the Battle of Cowpens.



KAPLAN Student Selected as Kaplan Leadership Scholar

UCNJ student Samir Perez was selected as one of only 11 students across the tristate area as a Kaplan Leadership Program (KLP) scholar for 2024-25. Samir is the sixth UCNJ student selected for this student success program, which supports high-achieving students at two-year schools who demonstrate educational acumen, leadership potential, and financial need.

Born in Cuba, Mr. Perez decided to begin his education at UCNJ after learning about the educational programs, extracurricular activities, and the opportunity for growth and connections. This past spring, Mr. Perez graduated from UCNJ with a degree in computer information systems. His career goal is to become a business analyst, a program manager, or a software engineer. He expects to transfer to Stevens Institute of Technology in the fall.



College Readiness Grant Hosts Conference for Incoming Students

65 high school students from UCNJ's Dual Enrollment partner schools attended the College Readiness Now program, which is a partnership among the Office of the Secretary of Higher Education, the New Jersey Council of County Colleges (NJCCC), all 18 of New Jersey's county and community colleges, and more than 60 New Jersey high schools. The purpose of the program is to support projects designed to get more students college-ready by the time they graduate from high school.

Students were grouped according to their career interest and met in breakout sessions with Academic Specialists, advisors, and community professionals to ask questions, explore career options, decide on important next steps, and expand their knowledge about their career choices.



Solar Decathlon Challenges Students to Net Zero

During the 2024-2025 academic year, the Department of Energy hosted the BuildingsNEXT Design Challenge (formerly the Solar Decathlon design challenge). The challenge was an international, intercollegiate competition that tasks teams with creating a building design that is powered by renewable energy to achieve "net zero emissions." To accomplish this, teams are made up of students from backgrounds in architecture, various STEM fields, and business.

UCNJ's team was founded and led by current student, Benjamin Greeley, and supported by Associate Professor of Chemistry Sherry Heidary, Associate

Professor of Engineering Jennifer Ebert, and Academic Specialist of Architecture Susana Sequeira. Teams worked with industry professionals to gain real-world experience that would be required to complete the design. Along with creating a sustainable design, the teams had to justify the renovation by completing a thorough cost-analysis, as well as improve the building in ways that would benefit the community and health of the building. The student team at UCNJ partnered with industry partners, competition alumni, and faculty advisors to create a unique

design for their own college campus. They competed on the world stage against senior universities during the 2025 BuildingsNext showcase event, held at the National Renewable Energy Lab in Golden, CO. Their participation in the event marked the first time that a community college competed in the challenge without a four-year university partner.

Additionally, one of the team's key industry partners was Page, a nationally recognized architecture and MEP engineering firm. Page invited the UCNJ team to visit their Washington, D.C. office, where students had the opportunity to present their project to over 120 employees, including one proud UCNJ alumnus!



Honors Societies that Shine

Phi Theta Kappa (PTK) lota Xi chapter is the largest honor society at UCNJ. PTK promotes scholarship, development of character, and leadership. To become a member, a student must complete at least 12 credit hours of coursework, maintain a 3.6 GPA or higher, and participate in volunteer activities throughout the semester. This past April, PTK held its new member ceremony with more than 200 new inductees. For decades, the lota Xi chapter has maintained its status as a Five Star Chapter among all the chapters in the Middle States Region.

PTK was recognized for several projects completed this year, including, "Green Minds: Students Feeding


the Future" and "Rise **Up: The Stories of Those** Who Acted." Green Minds was designed to support UCNJ's aim to fight against food insecurity. The chapter developed and executed a plan to provide fresh produce using the college's hydroponic systems to supply fresh vegetation to the food pantry and the College's farmers' market.

The Rise Up project taught the College community about activism from the student's perspective. The chapter told the stories of past and present student activists through a photographic exhibit as well as a panel discussion. These stories included perspectives from a global. national, and local level

including specific details about student activism that occurred at UCNJ during the late 60s and early 70s. The lota Xi chapter was also recognized for the hard work of their members. chapter officers. and advisors, receiving a total of nine awards at the Middle States Regional Conference.

The Psi Chapter of Chi Alpha Epsilon is a national honor society for students in the Educational Opportunity Fund (EOF) program.

The Omicron Beta chapter of Tau Alpha Pi National Honor Society is a national honor society for students in the engineering and engineering technology programs at UCNJ.

The Practical **Nursing Program** at UCNJ equips students with essential skills in patient care, assisting doctors and registered nurses with various medical tasks and treatments. Students are taught to provide compassionate and competent care to patients in various healthcare settings, including hospitals, clinics, and long-term care facilities. Upon graduating, students are eligible to take the NCLEX-PN examination for Practical Nurse licensure, which is supported by a voucher payment to help offset the cost of the licensing exam.

The College celebrated 41 new graduates over the spring and fall semesters at their pinning ceremony. Dr. Christiana Nwachukwu, Associate Professor in

Practical Nursing, awarded the pins to the graduates. Following the pinning, the graduates took the Nurses' Pledge and lit candles. The candles commemorate

Florence Nightingale's nighttime aid to wounded soldiers by candlelight.



Certified Medical Assistant Program is a Stellar Success

UCNJ's Certified Medical Assistant (CMA) program celebrated their second cohort's success with a completion ceremony, honoring the 16 graduates. The CMA program



prepares students for careers in high-demand healthcare fields. Graduates complete extensive hands-on training, classroom instruction, and certification preparation, which equips them with the skills to support clinical operations in hospitals, private practices, and urgent care centers. The 620-hour program curriculum includes course syllabi, daily lesson plans, materials, and was refined to meet current industry standards. Special thanks to Union County Commissioner Rebecca Williams for attending the completion ceremony and supporting UCNJ students!



A Breath of Success for 15 Respiratory Care Graduates

This year, 15 students graduated from UCNJ's Respiratory Care Program. Over the course of their program, students learn to administer medical gases and aerosolized drugs, assist physicians with diagnoses, and provide treatment and care to patients with disorders of the heart and lungs. Upon completion, students graduate with an Associate in Applied Science degree and are eligible to sit for the National Board of Respiratory Care credentialing exams.

The completion ceremony included remarks from Vice President for Academic Affairs Dr. Sara Lacagnino and Dean of the Plainfield Campus and Allied Sciences William Dunscombe. Also in attendance were clinical directors, instructional staff, laboratory staff, and the family and friends of the graduates.









From Classrooms to Crisis: **EMT Students Learn Life-Saving Skills**

The College offers several different levels of training in the field of Emergency Medical Services, including a Certificate or a Certificate of Achievement in Emergency Medical Studies. This year, 137 students completed the EMT program, including 25 from the Union County Vocational Technical

schools. Throughout their time at UCNJ, students complete ambulance ride along hours for field practice and to improve their skills.

The program has expanded their affiliations with local hospitals to meet field experience requirements, and includes three from Hackensack

Meridian Health, including JFK University Medical Center, Old Bridge Medical Center, and Bay Shore Medical Center, as well as RWJ University Hospital in Rahway. The EMT program is equipped with lifelike manikins, a simulation ambulance, and a road ambulance for students to practice emergency

scenarios and to learn critical thinking skills. Upon successful completion of their program, students are eligible to take the National Registry of **Emergency Medical** Technicians examination.



RWJBarnabas Health **School of Nursing** Celebrates 155 Graduates

The RWJBarnabas Health School of Nursing and UCNJ jointly offer a Cooperative Nursing Program, which awards a Diploma in Nursing from **RWJBarnabas** Health School of Nursing and an Associate of Science degree from UCNJ upon successful completion of the curriculum.

The program provides a sound theoretical foundation in nursing, biological, behavioral, and social sciences and integrates this knowledge into academic and practical experiences within the health and illness continuum of patient care. The program is accredited by The Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing (ACEN) and approved by the New Jersey State Board of Nursing.



The pinning and graduation ceremonies are combined at the **RWJBarnabas** Health Trinitas School of Nursing. 

Following the ceremony, attendees were invited to the




Victor M. Richel Student Commons for music, dancing, and empanadas. Continuing the celebration, the Women's Volleyball

Owls Soar Higher with Multiple Championship Wins

The victories began in the fall semester when **Esports** secured multiple championship titles through both the Call of Duty: Gunfight and Fortnite: No Build teams. The Fortnite team swept their competitors, Jackson College, 3-0, clinching their first regional championship in program history. UCNJ studentathletes include Tamir Reddick, Roger Fortunato, and Felix Parades.

The Call of Duty: Gunfight team had a perfect regular season and continued their dominance in the Regional Tournament. The Owls swept Pensacola State College 3-0 to capture the Regional Championship title and secure a spot in the NJCAAE National Championship for Fall 2024. In the national championship game, the Owls emerged victorious, adding another National title to the books. The Owls finished the fall '24 season undefeated, marking the first time in program history they

completed a season with a perfect record.

Esports continued their winning streak in the spring, earning two more Regional Championship titles and another trip to the NJCAAE National Championship. UCNJ student-athlete Santiago Puerto won regionals for Mario Kart 1v1, and the Call of Duty: Gunfight team, consisting of UCNJ student-athletes Paulo Matias, Bryan Carrillo, Samuel Arias, Xavier Hernandez, and Roger Fortunato, also won regionals. Mario Kart 1v1, Call of Duty: Gunfight, and Fortnite: No Build all qualified for the NJCAAE National Championship in Spring '25. Mario Kart 1v1 finished fourth in the nation, Fortnite: No Build finished third in the nation, and Call of Duty: Gunfight was victorious once again, winning the National Championship title.

The wins continued into the spring semester. Both the Men's and Women's

Basketball teams had outstanding seasons this year. On the men's side, the Owls finished their regular season with a 24-6 record and were seeded number one in the NJCAA DIII Men's Region XIX Tournament. The Owls went on to win the Region XIX Championship title and the North Atlantic District A Championship Tournament against Northampton Community College, also clinching a ticket to the NJCAA DIII Men's Basketball National

UCNJ Women's Basketball shined all season with a regular season record of 27-4, helping the Owls earn the number one seed in the NJCAA DII Women's Basketball Region XIX Tournament. The Owls also secured their spot at the NJCAA DII Women's **Basketball National**

Championship in Joplin, Missouri.

UCNJ Wrestling also made an impact this year. Freshman Josh Baeza brought home the gold, crowning him the 141 lb. District Champion. Five other Owls qualified for the NJCAA Men's Wrestling National Championship and traveled to Council Bluffs, Iowa.

With spring in full swing, the UCNJ Men's Volleyball team was on fire. The Owls broke several program records, including winning the Region XIX title with a 3-1 set victory. The Owls became the Garden State Athletic Conference (GSAC) Champions and NJCAA Region XIX Champions, earning a trip to the NJCAA Men's Volleyball Invitational in Canandaigua, New York.





UCNJ Graduate Honored for Historic Golf Season

After a successful golf season, UCNJ alumnus Patrick Murray ('24) received a championship ring. The celebration recognized Mr. Murray's remarkable athletic journey and the lasting impact he made during his time at the College. His success included winning both the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) Region XIX Championship and the Garden State Athletic (GSAC) Championship in back-to-back years. Mr. Murray's performances on the green earned him a spot in the NJCAA Division III Golf National Championships in his freshman and sophomore year. In his first year at nationals, he placed an

impressive 18th, but it was his second vear that solidified his status as one of the top golfers in the country, securing 7th place in the NJCAA Division III Golf National Championships. In addition, Mr. Murray earned All-American honors in both 2023 and 2024. After graduating from UCNJ, he transferred to Kean University with a 4.0 GPA and continues to play golf for their newly formed team.

Food insecurity can lead to a negative impact on academic performance and mental well-being. UCNJ assists students with this issue by offering food pantries, meal share programs, and





connections to community support services.

- Hoot's Market is an on-campus food pantry that assist students with pantry stable items.
- UCNJ Farmer's Market is a semesterly program that allows students to access free produce.
- Grubpass Program is an electronic fund that students can access to purchase hot meals from the campus cafeteria.
- Hoots Lunch Box offers weekly free entrées for students.

These food insecurity initiatives are also supported with generous funding provided by the Union County Board of County Commissioners.



Mental Health & Wellness On Campus Services



The College provides mental health support for all students. Services include:

• UWill: Students receive free immediate access to teletherapy at anytime.





Food insecurity is a serious issue affecting a significant portion of the student body. A recent survey revealed alarming statistics:

 52% of UCNJ students worried their food would run out before they had money to buy more;

- 64% reported eating less than they should have due to financial constraints:
- 52% went hungry because they lacked food or money to purchase it

These numbers highlight the urgent need for action, and thanks to the generosity of donors, faculty, staff, and community partners, incredible progress has been made. This year, the Nourish the Future campaign raised over \$250,000, providing essential resources to support the College's Food Insecurity Program. These funds have helped stock food pantries, provided meal vouchers, and ensured students have the support they need to stay focused on their education.

This initiative is more than just providing meals—it's about giving students the confidence and security to pursue their dreams without the weight of hunger holding them back. The overwhelming success of Nourish the Future is a testament to what can be achieved when the UCNJ community comes together.

New Annual & Endowed Scholarships – FY 25

Cooperative Counseling Services Scholarship for Parents

Awarded to full- or part-time students who are parents of children under 18 years old. Recipients must reside in Union County and preference will be given to students who demonstrate financial need and who desire to finish their degrees.

Daniel Family Scholarship

Awarded to a full- or part-time student majoring in criminal justice. Student must have a GPA of 2.5 or higher at time of award.

Donna J Del Vecchio Memorial Scholarship

Awarded to new or existing PTA students. Returning students must have a 2.0 or better GPA. Preference will be given to students who demonstrate financial need.

Greater Westfield Area Chamber of Commerce Scholarship

Awarded to full- or parttime business students or students in business-related curriculum. Recipients must be from Westfield, Garwood, Fanwood, Clark, Scotch Plains, or Mountainside. Preference will be given to students who demonstrate financial need.

Susan L. Hudak Memorial Scholarship

Awarded to a full-time student who has completed 15 credits. Recipient must be a member of a club, organization, honor society, or the Academic Learning Center. Preference will be given to a Linden resident. If none qualifies, then it will be awarded to a Union County resident.

Marianne M. Kerwin Scholarship

Awarded to a full-time student with a minimum 3.5 GPA. Recipient must be a mathematics major or an education major concentrating in mathematics.

Katlyn Millea Memorial Scholarship

Awarded to a full- or parttime student majoring in Fine Arts or English disciplines. Preference will be given to students who demonstrate financial need.

Mayor Al Morgan Scholarship

Awarded to a full- or parttime incoming student who has earned a minimum high school GPA of 2.0. Recipient must reside in New Providence, have earned a diploma from New Providence High School, and show community involvement. Preference given to those students who demonstrate financial need.

Jim & Judy O'Brien Friendly Sons Scholarship

Awarded to a full-time, firstgeneration student who has a minimum 2.5 GPA and a minimum of 30 credits. Student must be a Union County resident.

Serafina Oxner-Against All Odds Scholarship

Awarded to a full- or part-time student who has completed 15 credits with a 3.5 GPA at the time of award. Recipient must be a non-traditional student (above age 25) who is a working parent. Preference given to a student who demonstrates financial need.

Arlene Rogoff Scholarship for Women in Mathematics

Awarded to a female student majoring in Mathematics. Recipient must have a minimum 3.0 GPA, have completed between 45-60 credits, and intends to transfer to a four-year institution. Preference will be given to a student who demonstrates financial need.

Sloan Family Scholarship

Awarded to a full-time, first generation UCNJ student. Student must have a 2.5 GPA with a minimum of 30 credits completed.

Dr. Donovan A. Smalls & Jacqueline Nixon-Smalls Scholarship

Awarded to a full or part-time student majoring in business with concentrations in management and marketing. Recipient must have a minimum 3.0 GPA at the time of application. Preference will be given to a student who demonstrates financial need.

STEM Academic Specialists Scholarship

Awarded to full-time, 2nd year STEM students who have completed their first year at UCNJ. Recipients must have minimum GPA of 3.0. Preference will be given to students who demonstrate financial need.

Summit College Club Foundation Scholarship

Awarded to full or part-time female students who have had a break in education of at least one semester. Students must have completed 12 credits, have a minimum 3.0 GPA, and must be enrolled for a minimum of six credits per semester. Preference will be given to students who demonstrate financial need.

Systemic Humanities Scholarship

Awarded to a full-time student with 3.0 GPA, majoring in one of the humanities degree programs.

Tasharofi Health Science Scholarship

Awarded to students pursuing education in the health science field who demonstrate financial need.





Summary & Outlook

UCNJ Union College of Union County, NJ entered FY25 with a commitment to student success, access, and institutional agility. The FY25 budget was designed not only to sustain core operations but to expand student services, address basic needs, and enhance affordability—all without raising tuition for the fifth consecutive year.

Key achievements in FY25 included:

- Enrollment Growth: The College experienced a 5.15% increase in enrollment supported by the launch of a comprehensive Strategic Enrollment Management (SEM) plan to sustain and build on that growth.
- Flat Tuition for Fifth Consecutive **Year:** The College maintained tuition rates to ensure cost is not a barrier to access—marking five years of zero tuition increases.
- Investments in Student Success: Funding was expanded for tutoring, social work, and advising services.
- Food Insecurity Initiative: A dedicated institutional budget was established to address food insecurity, prioritizing student well-being as an academic success strategy.
- Faculty & Staff Investment: The College prioritized professional development and wellness

programming, including support for ACUE certification and staff training aligned with institutional goals.

These accomplishments reflect UCNJ's continued focus on sustainability, responsiveness, and inclusivity, all while preserving the integrity of the academic experience and supporting our mission of transforming lives through education.

Contextualizing Within Higher Education Trends

The College's financial strategies were developed in response to national and regional trends impacting higher education. Institutions are increasingly challenged by:

- Enrollment declines in traditional student populations.
- Intensified focus on affordability and return on investment.
- Evolving state and federal funding models, often tied to outcomes and equity.

 Shifting student expectations for flexible, career-relevant programs.

By proactively responding to these forces, the College is better positioned to maintain financial stability while meeting the changing needs of its student body.

Outlook for FY26 and Beyond


Looking to FY26 and beyond, UCNJ remains steadfast in its mission to expand opportunity through affordability, access, and student-centered innovation. The College will:

- Sustain investments in food insecurity initiatives, recognizing the importance of basic needs in academic persistence and completion.
- Enhance affordability and reduce cost barriers, including a planned reduction in tuition for out-of-county residents and the elimination of the transcript fee—initiatives that directly support equitable access and mobility for all learners.
- Strengthen pathways for transfer and job placement, expanding articulation

agreements, work-based learning, and career-aligned programming consistent with the Community College 3.0 vision.

- Embed micro-credentials into academic programs, allowing students to earn stackable, workforce-relevant credentials throughout their degree journey.
- Refine advising and career services to increase personalized support for diverse learners, including adult and returning students.
- Modernize infrastructure and systems, with continued upgrades to instructional technology, digital engagement tools, and administrative operations.

Through these initiatives, UCNJ will continue to position itself as a leader among community collegeslowering barriers, lifting potential, and driving student success at every stage.
