

Directed Self-Placement For English

Dear UCNJ Student,

Welcome! The faculty and staff at UCNJ Union College of Union County, NJ are looking forward to supporting you as you work to fulfill your educational and career goals and obtain your associate degree.

The first part of registration involves placement into the appropriate English courses. To help you select the English courses that are best for you in your first semester and will enable you to be successful, we have implemented a Directed Self-Placement process. The Directed Self-Placement process will help you figure out which of Union's English courses are the best match for you based on your current reading and writing skills, critical thinking skills, and intended major.

This process consists of three steps:

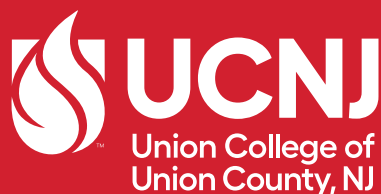
1. Reviewing Course Expectations and Course Descriptions;
2. Filling out the Directed Self-Placement Questionnaires;
3. Selecting your preferred English course(s).

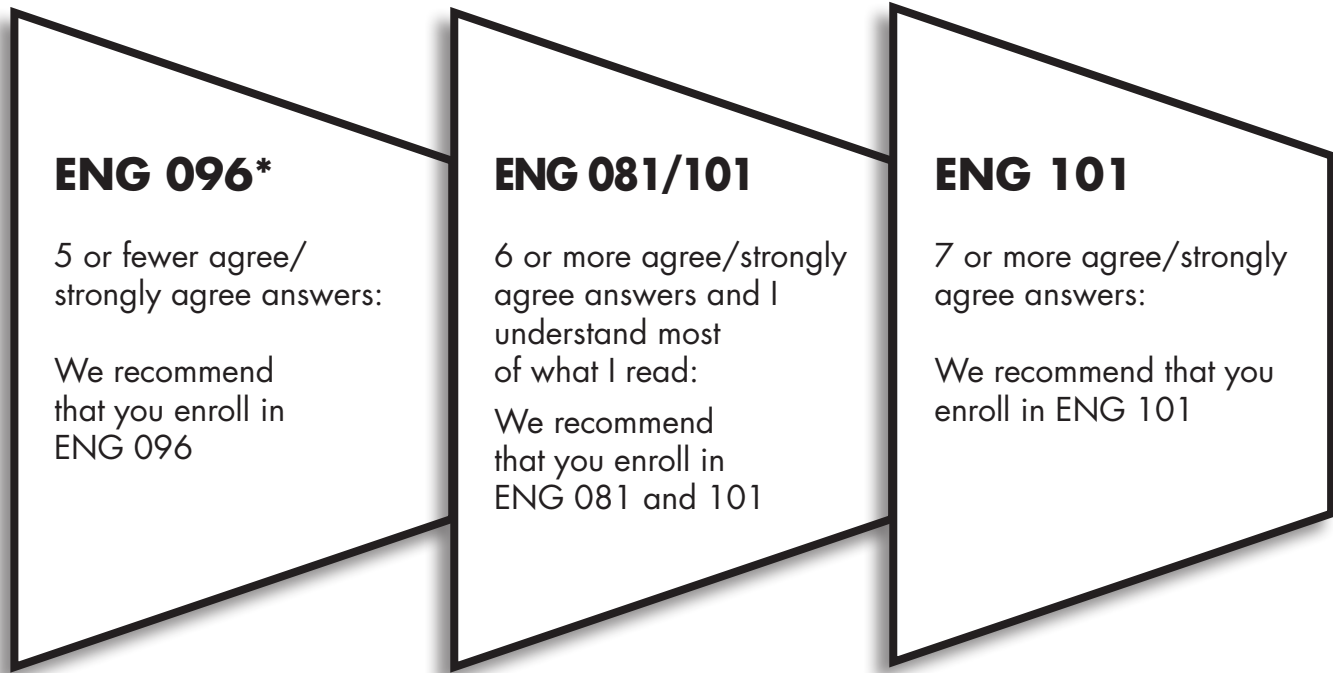
Course	ENG 096*	ENG 081/101*	ENG 101
Credits	6 credits	5 credits	3 credits
Description	This course is designed to help students whose reading ability indicates the need for concentrated involvement in the reading process, particularly to improve comprehension, critical reading, and vocabulary. This course also helps students with concentrated attention to language use/word choice.	ENG 081 is a two-credit course paired with an ENG 101 to help improve reading skills.	This course focuses on the development of the student's skills in writing about nonfiction. Students practice reading and writing at the college-level and prepare to do various kinds of research and papers applicable to multiple disciplines.
Reading time per week	10-15 pages per week	20+ pages per week	20+ pages per week
Essays	4-5 essays (and portfolio work)	4-5 essays	4-5 essays

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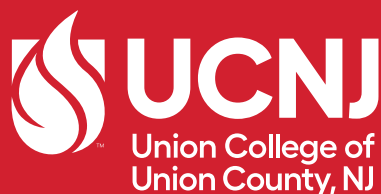
