


Renowned Scholar to Highlight Founders' Day Celebration in October

Dr. John Carmichael

Student, Army lieutenant, salesman, entrepreneur, dean, college president, consultant, volunteer, family man, professor - Dr. John Carmichael has been all of these and more. At UCC, where since 1982 he has been Senior Professor of Business, he is also known as the initiator of UCC telecourses (1982, broadcast on Channel 13), and the advisor to both the Christian Fellowship Club and, for 20 years, the Business Management Association, which sponsors speakers and trips to Wall Street.

Two-year colleges have been a constant in his life. He graduated from the former Fisher Junior

College in Boston before serving three years in the Army and then earning a BS in Management and Economics from Suffolk U. Then followed an MA in Administration of Higher Education from Columbia U., and from Michigan State U., where he was a Kellogg Fellow, an MBA and a Ph.D. in Business Education.

John Carmichael's career is remarkable for his involvement in the opening of three institutions and also the closing of three. The openings included Essex County Collegewhere he was Dean of Instructional Resources from 1968 until 1974; Indiana Northern U., a forerunner of the college without walls, and the Northeastern Institute of Biblical Studies, which in 1999 opened in the Empire State Building, the result of a merger of Northeastern Bible College, where he was Chairman of the Board of Trustees, and The King's College.

The three closings were the Northeastern Bible College, Indiana Northern U., and the Union County Technical Institute and Vocational Center (UCTI) in Scotch Plains. Dr. Carmichael was President/Superintendent of UCTI and instrumental in its merger with Union College to form Union County College in 1982. In The Remaking of a College: Union County College 1982-1992 author Roy W. Smith calls Dr. Carmichael "an unrecognized hero of the merger" and "a class act".

Focus on Faculty

Before coming to UCTI, he was President of Westmoreland County Community College in Pennsylvania for six years. His busy professional life includes consulting to higher education institutions and businesses, for which he was recognized as the 75th Anniversary Honoree of the Middle States Association for Colleges and Universities for his outstanding service as an evaluation team member and consultant. Dr. Carmichael has served 15 years on the regional Consortium on Distance Education (CODE) Board.

Proud grandparents of five, he and his wife Dr. Carolyn W. Carmichael, professor of communication sciences at Kean U., live in Berkeley Heights. Their two daughters also work in higher education, one as a dean of students at Union U. in Jackson, Tennessee, and one as a director of citizen and service learning at Southwest Missouri State U.

John Carmichael is a great example of the quality and dedication found in the UCC faculty. He loves teaching and coaching his students and uses his impressive education and life experiences to help prepare them for success in the business world. <u>Carmichael@ucc.edu</u>.

Jesus Javier Caro '88





"It's my way of saying thank you for the education that I received," Jesus Caro wrote about his contribution to *Shaping Our Future* and his new Lifetime Membership in the UCC Alumni Association.

After emigrating from Colombia in 1982 at age 21, Jesus became proficient in English at UCC's Institute for Intensive English. Encouraged by his ESL teachers to get a degree, he went on to earn an Associate's degree in Computer Science/Data Processing at UCC, and then a BS in Computer Science from Kean U. and a Master's in Information Systems Management from Seton Hall University.

He writes, "I did all this while working fulltime. During my school nights I met many people who were working full-time and taking night classes. Some of them were single mothers coping with school, work, and motherhood. If it was hard for me, imagine how hard it must have been for them."

After graduating from UCC in 1988, he says, "It was the quality of education that I received at UCC that helped me land a job related to my career." Now his career as a consultant for IBM Business Consulting Services (and formerly for Price Waterhouse) has taken him to Japan, Italy, and Australia and across this country. His specialty is ERT packages, large-scale applications for corporations. Assigned to Boston for the past two years, Jesus maintains his home in Clark, NJ, where he has family, although his sister Gisela Caro, a 1989 alumna, now lives in California.

Jesus Caro's talent and hard work are keys to his success, but he gives credit to UCC, where he was an **Educational Opportunity** Fund (EOF) student and worked as a lab assistant for IT. "When I first talked to my UCC counselor. I did not have the slightest idea about what I wanted to do or take as a career. His guidance was of paramount importance in my life as well as the education that I received at UCC. I found the teachers and professors at UCC to be very personable, accessible, and most of all, caring." He found here the helping hands he needed and teachers and counselors who wanted him to succeed.



"I'll always support UCC. I'm grateful for what I gained there – it was a blast," Beverly Fredericks said during a phone call to thank her for her gift to *Shaping Our Future.* Her Copper Leaf on the Tree of Education in the Commons reads, "With God all things are possible."

But her giving didn't stop there. Like many UCC students, Beverly went to school the hard way, working and paying her own way. Because she wanted to make it easier for somebody else, to make their way in the world a little smoother than hers had been, in January 2003 Beverly Fredericks became, at age 29, the youngest scholarship donor in the College's history.

She established the annual "Truth Scholarship", first awarded in the 2003 spring semester to a student who met the criteria she selected. Each recipient must be a full-time student who has completed at least 12 credits with a 2.75 GPA; must live in Cranford, Elizabeth or Plainfield, and must plan to transfer to a 4year institution. She also asked that the student write a short essay about why his or her major was chosen.

"I always said I'd help someone some day – if you help someone in your life, your life is not in vain." She said she had seen how students have to struggle and the pressures they're under, and is very happy to be able to help with her scholarship.

After earning her LPN in 1999, Beverly received her Associate in Science degree in 2003. She works at a rehab center for the elderly in Montclair. She loves nursing, and says that it is a profession that is "noble and giving and sweet", one, which, although it can be stressful, brings great rewards. She feels better at the end of the day when she is able to help someone else feel better.

This exceptional UCC graduate lives in East Orange, and plans to study for her RN credential. Her hobbies include writing poetry, aerobics, and listening to spiritual music. Rh234a@aol.com.
