Sophomore Marc Henkel of Roselle Park finished in 2nd place overall and qualified for the National Tournament, where he posted scores of 88, 72, 76, and 74, finishing tied for 46th place out of 102 Division II golfers.

GOVERNOR LAUNCHES NJ STARS AT UCC —

TOP 20% OF HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES
IN LINE FOR FULL SCHOLARSHIPS TO
COMMUNITY COLLEGE



Ten days in advance of the official bill-signing, Governor James E. McGreevey used Union County College as the backdrop to kick-off his newly enacted NJ STARS Scholarship Program. On June 19, the Governor and UCC President Dr. Thomas H. Brown addressed a workshop on planning and paying for college conducted by the New Jersey Higher Education Student Assistance Authority and the Sallie Mae Fund. Attended by over 200 parents and high school students, the highlight of the day was the Governor's address detailing the specifics of this exciting new program.

The State will pay full tuition and fees at New Jersey community colleges for all Garden State seniors who graduate at the top 20 percent of their high school class. Class of 2004 high school graduates are the first who will be eligible for these awards.

"For the first time, New Jersey is guaranteeing that every student at the top of their class will have access to a college education,"

Governor McGreevev said. "NJ STARS poses a challenge to our high school students: You work hard and make the grades, and we will cover the cost of your education." The program will be funded by \$10 million in the State's Fiscal 2005 budget, and will create opportunities for 9,000 students statewide. Of that number, 1,072 Class of '04 graduates are eligible from high schools within Union County.

"The fact that the NJ STARS Scholarship is being offered to the academic cream of the crop to be used exclusively for attendance at a community college is testament to the high quality of education that UCC and our fellow community colleges provide," said UCC President Brown. "Our alumni have always been living evidence of UCC's educational excellence and with the vote of confidence now expressed by the establishment of NJ STARS, a UCC degree is even more valuable." 

"Project Inside" Teaches Students Behind Bars

"Can you help them?" his grandson asked, upon learning that his grandfather taught prisoners. UCC 1951 alumnus Norm Hobbie has been an Adjunct Professor with "Project Inside" since it began in 1998. Funded by a federal grant to the New Jersey Dept. of Corrections, "Project Inside" gives inmates in prisons throughout New Jersey an opportunity to receive a "Small Business Employee Readiness" certificate and 22-24 transferable college credits.

Only inmates under the age of 25 with a high school diploma and/or G.E.D who are five years away from parole can participate.

Norm believes the program does help them, and he asks his students, "unless you have something more important to do here, how could you not learn?"

Giving inmates an education can possibly deter them from returning to jail and help them lead a better life.

Norm teaches Communications at UCC and Kean University and has taught at most of the "Project Inside" facilities. Elizabeth McCracken is the Project Coordinator, and adjunct professors teach 12 – 15 courses each semester. When Norm was told about "Project Inside" he said, "It sounded interesting and challenging. I get to meet some really neat people. I'm lucky İ'm teaching a course I love and it's about inter-personal relationships. I learn more about me every time I teach it".

Class sizes tend to run between 15-20 students and prison officials try to work around the professors' schedules. Incarceration comes first and education second, and the professors must abide by prison rules. The project serves the Adult Diagnostic & Treatment Center in Avenel, East Jersey State Prison in Rahway, Edna Mahan Correctional Facility for Women in Clinton, Mountainview Youth Correctional Facility in Annandale, and Northern State Prison in Newark.

The inmates can take courses in: Business Mathematics, Criminal Justice or Social Science, Introductory Technical and Business Writing, The Dynamics of Communication, Accounting, Small Business Management, Computer Literacy, Salesmanship, Principles of Marketing, Keyboarding for the Computer and Introduction to Computer Applications.

Most of the facilities hold a graduation ceremony and, depending on the level of security, family members and friends may attend. While it's usually a small ceremony, the diploma can be extremely important, demonstrating at inmates' parole hearings that they've done something productive while incarcerated.

Norm has fascinating stories about inmates who transformed themselves from criminals to 4.0 GPA college students once out of jail. "There's no better feeling than when you hear a student say, 'I just want to thank you. That class you taught me was the first one I took and really got me interested in the subject'. I've had some of the best students. I've seen them learn leadership skills and watched them coordinate heavy discussions. At the end of the semester, it is so rewarding." he exclaims proudly. 🚺



Focus on Faculty

Prof. Eileen Forestal, M.Ed., RSC, Master Mentor

"Deaf people can do everything, except hear."

A TRAILBLAZER FOR DEAF STUDIES

When Eileen Forestal moved to New Jersey in 1978, there were no programs to teach Deaf studies or to train interpreters. Having taught for three years at a community college in Illinois, she persuaded Union College President Dr. Sol Orkin to develop a similar program at UCC. Under Prof. Forestal's leadership for 25 years, UCC's American Sign Language Studies and ASL-English Interpreting Programs at UCC are recognized nationally. Prof. Forestal holds a BA degree in Sociology (U. of Missouri), an M.Ed. in Deaf Education (Western Maryland College), and a Certificate in Teaching ASL/Interpreting (U. of Colorado). Her latest credential is a 2003 Certificate from the new Online Master Mentor Program at Northeastern U., which accepts only 20 students a year. This new concept in interpreter education seeks to bridge the gap between an interpreter's completion of studies and employment. She was honored by being asked to teach in the program this year, and hopes eventually to develop a mentoring program at UCC.

When asked, she said her biggest challenge as a Deaf student herself was attending public school back in the "dark ages" when there were few services, the TTY was a heavy monstrous machine, and social and physical barriers abounded. As the

only Deaf student in her high school in Missouri, she was expected to sit in the front row and try to read lips! The Division of Vocational Rehabilitation in Missouri was not prepared to help with college education. Interpreting services back then were unheard of.

Since 1985 Eileen Forestal has been a national consultant and trainer on ASL, ASL Culture, ASL Storytelling, Deaf Interpreting, Mentoring, and interpreting-related topics. She has taught at Northeastern U. and Montclair State U., and also at the secondary level. It's impossible to detail here the scope of her years of participation and leadership for the Deaf community and Deaf studies.

A few highlights: serving as the Sign Language Consultant/Performance Director for many plays and musicals at Papermill Playhouse; directing Miss Deaf New Jersey Pageants; being appointed by Gov. Kean to a State Commission studying services available to Deaf children; chairing a state-wide conference on "HIV/AIDS and the Deaf Community", and serving on the Deaf Women United Board, and the New Jersey Task Force on Arts Access.

She quotes, "Deafness is not so tragic – the dearth of services is a travesty." It has only been 10 years since the requirements of the landmark Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) had to be in place. The pendulum swings back, however, and now a crucial advocacy issue in the Deaf community is assuring that government funding for closed captioning of 120 TV

shows is not taken away. Equal access to communication and information is a vital issue, as is the acceptance of American Sign Language as a world language.

Eileen Forestal delights in her large blended family, with two sons, four stepdaughters, and five grandchildren, from a 15-month old to teenagers. The life-altering experience of dealing with breast cancer has brought her family even closer. At her home in Ocean Grove, NJ she finds time to enjoy cooking, reading, kayaking, bicycling, and making soap.
