Meet Dr. Margaret M. McMenamini, the New President of UNION County College

When you meet Dr. Margaret M. McMenamini, the new president of Union County College, you will encounter a natural leader possessing a unique mix of infectious

enthusiasm, profound respect for tradition and a tendency to question the status quo. Her experience, optimism and ambitions mirror those of many of Union's alumni.

Growing up in central New Jersey, Dr. McMenamini was always looking for opportunities to play a positive role in the community. In high school, she lobbied to create the first girls' athletic program at the school. Her hard work paid off when the girls' basketball team won the Shore Conference championship three years later.

"Most young people in Union County have dreams and ground-breaking ideas. I was just lucky, I found people who believed in me. That's what I want to be for the students and alumni: someone supportive, who understands that by uniting with extraordinary individuals and fostering their talents, we can transform our community," Dr. McMenamini explained.

That visionary philosophy has served her well. Dr. McMenamini earned a scholarship to Temple University where she graduated cum laude with a B.S. in Physical Therapy. After graduation, Dr. McMenamini worked as a Physical Therapist for five years before joining the faculty at Lehigh Carbon Community College (LCCC) in Pennsylvania. "When I was given the opportunity to teach, I couldn't resist the chance. I believe in the college experience and I was honored to teach what I had learned to anyone who was interested."

Teaching changed Dr. McMenamini's life. "I loved working with students directly. In very few jobs can you have a direct impact on opening someone's mind, showing them something they never imagined before and supporting them when they struggle. If you are there for them during those moments, you will never be forgotten. People remember the teachers who offered them a safe environment where they can learn and take risks."


It was during her early years of teaching that Dr. McMenamini became enthusiastic about the comprehensive community college philosophy. "Unlike universities and four-year colleges, the commu-

nity college is 100% student-focused and it respects the needs of the entire community, including transfer-minded students, those who want to pursue a career immediately after graduation, locals who need to enhance their professional skill sets and life-long learners who are always looking for something new. Seeing how a community college orchestrates all of its assets to deliver real value to students with such diverse interests inspired me to earn my Master's at the University of Scranton and Doctorate in Educational Leadership at Lehigh University."

In 2000, Dr. McMenamini was named LCCC's Vice President for Academic and Student Affairs. "Leaving teaching was tough," she admitted. "I loved the classroom, but I knew I could make a more meaningful impact by working in the college's administration."

When Dr. McMenamini was offered the opportunity to return to New Jersey as Brookdale Community College's Executive Vice President of Educational and Student Services, she jumped at the chance. During her five years at Brookdale, Dr. McMenamini facilitated enormous changes in the way the College interacted with students. She spearheaded the proliferation of technologically enhanced classrooms, allowing students and faculty to work in a state-of-the-art atmosphere vital to today's learning environment. Under her leadership, Brookdale also moved into student-centered course scheduling, offering classes at the most convenient times for those who take them and designing a system by which, as popular classes close, additional sections open.

Dr. McMenamini is particularly interested in strengthening Union's already impressive alumni association and community outreach. "The people who have attended and graduated from Union County College are our current students' most valuable assets," she explained. "They have the power to mentor, help them find jobs and offer inspiration that they too can succeed and gain from the Union experience. I welcome everyone who has ever studied here, and those who live in the County to join us in shaping Union's bright future. Together we can create an invincible network of individuals who celebrate and support each other's successes and enrich each other's lives."

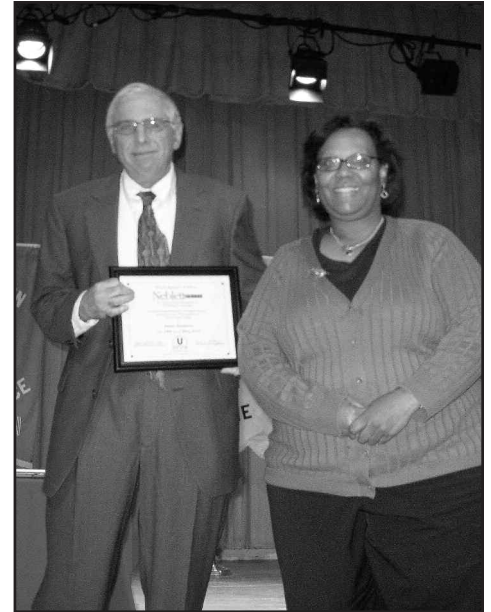

Alumni Profile

Rachael Paulson '80, always knew that she wanted to work with children, and as a teenager would travel to Newark with her father to work with disadvantaged youth. After the sudden death of her seven-year-old brother Johnny, which affected her deeply, Rachael took some time off from her studies at Kean University, to find her own path.

When she decided to resume her education a few years later, Rachael chose Union County College because of its convenience and affordability. UCC became a second home for her, where it was not unusual for her to spend six hours a day studying with fellow students. Rachael credits Violet Wilmore, her counselor at UCC, who pushed her to succeed and guided her toward a future in education. She also cites English professor, Dr. Karl Oelke, for inspiring her to write.

After graduating from UCC, Rachael returned to Kean University and earned a degree in Early Childhood and Special Education. For 15 years, she taught Special Education in Roselle and then later in Texas before leaving to start a family.

It was a simple question from one of her children that inspired a whole new direction for Rachael's life, "Why do we recycle?" She published two children's books on recycling *Johnny and the Old Oak Tree* and *Sir Johnny's Recycling*

Adventure. She also developed a workshop for elementary school children to help them understand the recycling process.

Rachael used the proceeds from her efforts to purchase books, run her workshops and develop projects like planting trees or gardens in schools in impoverished areas.

The success of her children's books opened up a new world of opportunity for Rachael. She presented her workshops and signed books with former First

Lady Barbara Bush and renowned primatologist Jane Goodall, and was invited by the United Nations to meet with children from over 120 countries to share her work during the United Nations Environmental Children's Conference in 2000. At this meeting, Rachael connected with children and individuals from many developing nations. "I was amazed at how many kids had never slept in a bed or eaten with a fork and spoon. Many of them did not even have running water."

When she returned home, Rachael began researching her next book. She was encouraged to research the more than 700 schools in South Africa that lacked a basic necessity we take for granted - running water. She spoke with water companies, drilling companies, and different schools for her research. In time Rachael made contact with a school in Kwa-Zulu-Natal where students tended their small school garden by carrying water by hand from a distant ravine. Johnson and Johnson in South Africa offered to fund a trip to the school to run her workshop for the students.

When she arrived in Kwa-Zulu-Natal and saw how the students were forced to retrieve water, she decided to act. She contacted the drilling company to whom she had been speaking about her next book and agreed to pay for them to drill for water near the school. Rachael saw quickly how the search for water not only brought the community together, but also focused national attention on the lack of basic necessities in the area.

Putting her book on hold, she began working with that community to sustain and expand the project to include planting food gardens and installing sinks. When other schools in rural South Africa began contacting her for assistance, she decided to create a non-profit organization to assist with fundraising and other aspects of the project. She founded **Hands on the World Global** in 2006.

As a part of the new organization, Rachael developed a model called the "Green Community Hub" that each school system must follow in order to be included. It consists of five stages; connecting the school to water, running pipes to the community and installing sinks in the schools, creating a seedling garden program, offering workshops about water options, filters, sanitation taught through art, music, literacy, and writing, and a Community Awareness Day where the people and the local government are invited to take ownership of the project.

Today, Rachael can proudly point to five communities in South Africa where she helped create sustainable Green Community Hubs. She is currently expanding her work to Ghana and Haiti as well.

Rachael also works with schools and youth groups in the United States and internationally, to teach them about the environment, and about South Africa. She travels to schools to offer workshops and helps students design murals to send schools in South Africa. She also works with local colleges and universities to send interns to the hubs in Africa to both learn and teach.

"I want to thank Union County College for being my safe haven as I now set out to create safe havens for children around the world," she said. "UCC worked as my bridge, crossing over from grief to healing and leading me to become the person I am today."

Theater Project Stages Musical for the First Time

For the first time since the Theater Project began in 1994, Union County College's Professional Theater Company will be offering a musical as part of its 2010 Season. *Crowns*, based on the book *Crowns: Portraits of Black Women in Church Hats* by Michael Cunningham and Craig Marberry and adapted by Regina Taylor, tells the story of a young black girl from Brooklyn, who is sent down south by her family after the murder of her brother. It is there that she is able to cope with her loss and learn about her roots through tradition, music, and church hats, "a symbol of the pride, beauty, and endurance of black women everywhere."

Set to traditional gospel music, *Crowns* will feature a six piece orchestra that accompanies the performers. Among the cast is UCC Alumna,

Daaimah Talley and UCC Professor Andre DeSandies of the Institute for Intensive English.

"Crowns has always been everyone's favorite here at the Theater Project," said Mark Spina, Artistic Director for the Theater Project. "I think that our community will really enjoy this musical."

The Theater Project was able to expand the scope of its offerings this year after being awarded a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts.

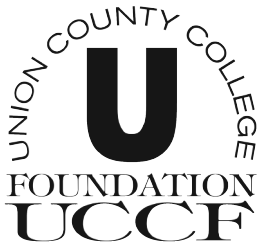
