## Study Proves It: A UCC Education Is a Good Investment

In six and a half years UCC students recover all costs, including wages foregone while attending college, and enjoy a <u>22.7%</u> return on their Union County College educational investment. This is just one intriguing finding in the first economic impact study of New Jersey's 19 county colleges by CCBenefits Inc., a research firm engaged by the New Jersey Council of County Colleges.

Union County College, the oldest of the New Jersey two-year colleges, can boast that:

• 85% of students stay in the region and contribute to the local economy, spending an average 37 years in the workforce and earn \$382,891 more than individuals with a high school degree or a GED.

• Business sales in the Union County Economic Region are \$941 million greater, and labor income is \$356 million greater due to the past and present operations of UCC.

• UCC activities encourage new business, assist existing business, and create long-term economic growth. It is estimated that the present workforce embodies over 3.3 million credit and non-credit hours of past and present UCC training.

• UCC's spending alone generated \$1.60 in salaries and benefits for every dollar

appropriated by state and local government.

• Accounting for increased tax receipts and avoided costs, state and local government will see a rate of return of <u>16.1%</u> on their fiscal 2002 support of Union County College.

• The state government actually makes money on its investment in UCC, which puts more money back in the state treasury than it takes out.

Unfortunately, New Jersey's county colleges are facing a cut of 5% of their state operating funds in the budget to close the state's unprecedented budget gap. For Union County College, this means a loss of \$770,000 in fiscal year 2004. Plans are under way to respond to this funding cut.

The author and management guru Tom Peters is a fan of community colleges like UCC, and wrote, "Support your community colleges! They are the unsung, under-funded backbone of America's all important lifelong learning network."


## DID YOU KNOW!

## Yvonne C. La Mons '03

#### **Degrees Galore**

Class of 2003 graduate Yvonne La Mons is a woman of many talents and interests, and no doubt the most degreed graduate UCC has ever had. She has earned both an AS in Business Administration and an AAS in General Business from Mercer County Community College, a BS in Business Administration from the College of New Jersey, an MA in the Graduate Program for Administrators from Rider U., a JD from Rutgers U. School of Law - Newark, and now an AA in American Sign Language and Deaf Studies from Union County College.

As Yvonne tells it, her story "is one of determination, persistence, pain, planning, perseverance, overcoming life's obstacles and keeping a positive attitude". She has battled an impoverished childhood with serious family problems, a failed marriage, being a single parent of three, and cancer. Most of her education was obtained at night while working.

This trail blazer was the only female in the New Jersey State Judiciary to hold the position of Court Executive/ Trial Court Administrator for Camden County, responsible for 600+ employees and a \$21 million budget.

She took an early retirement in 2002 to pursue her dream of working in the legal field with the Deaf Community. Despite a long commute from her home in Medford, she came to UCC because it has "the best deaf-studies program in the tri-state area" and because she wanted to be taught signing naturally. Yvonne says her teachers have made learning fun, although she admits to having been "busted" for breaking the contract students sign each semester to never speak in class. She has the highest praise for the program's founder and director, Prof. Eileen Forestal.

After graduation, she will work at a New Brunswick law firm where 80% of the clients are deaf, and will take the NJ and PA bar exams, since she was prohibited from practicing law while working in the courts.

Yvonne gives herself wholeheartedly to everything she does, with the philosophy that it is truly energizing to get involved and that one gets so much out of life this way. Thus at UCC she was an award-winning reporter and copy editor for the Scroll, Vice President of the Student Interpreters Group Network (S.I.G.N. Club), Editor of S.I.G.N. Post and chair of three committees for the American Sign Language Festival at UCC, designer of the new UCC flag, and selected for Phi Theta Kappa's All-State Academic Team in 2003. She was also the Faculty Nominated Winner of the "Phenomenal Women Essay Contest" and found time to be a peer tutor at the Academic Learning Center.

This new UCC alumna says she loves the wonderful cultural diversity here and takes delight in teaching students the ABC's of academic success. The UCC Alumni Association welcomes her leadership skills, energy and creativity.
