Alumni Profile Beverley E. Watts '99

Beverley Watts believes in the power of quotations to inspire and motivate her students, and she selected the one above for this article. Although she has had more than her fair share of setbacks and obstacles, she was able to reenter the classroom and finally realize her educational objectives.

An Adjunct Professor of Business at UCC since September, this dynamic woman obviously loves teaching and revels in sharing both her academic knowledge and life learning with her students. She writes, Discipline, determination and focus are tools that I use to illustrate to my students how imperative an education is. I am a strong advocate of critical thinking, and I am hoping to give my students the opportunity to think constructively and be able to express themselves freely.

Professor Watts began her academic journey with courses at Hudson Community College, then earned two degrees at UCC – an AAS in Business Management in 1999, and in 2000 an AS in Restaurant Management in the new joint program with Fairleigh Dickinson U. (FDU). In 2002 she graduated from FDU

with a BA in General Studies, with a specialization in Hospitality. Then in 2003 she became a Certified Hospitality Educator (CHE) while completing her Master's at FDU in Hospitality Management Studies with a concentration in Education. Next fall her journey continues with online studies for an Ed.D. in Counseling Psychology with Argosy U., Sarasota, FL.

Born in Jamaica, Beverley came to the US as an adult and had a variety of jobs, including several years as personal chef to a major movie producer. (Cooking remains one of her passions.) The chief joy and challenge of her life is her 20-year old daughter Khadine, whose autism has taught her "great patience and compassion". They live in Roselle with her husband of 16 years, Carlton Watts, recently retired from a career with PSE&G.

Her enthusiasm for her teaching is infectious, and it is easy to see she has found her calling. She credits and gives thanks to all the wonderful professors who nurtured her at UCC and at FDU, and she wants to give back. Some of her future goals are to create a "Youth Connection" in Roselle to help teenagers understand the importance of a good education, and to teach culinary arts to young people with disabilities. Project Centro Hispanico – "Empowerment Through Education"

A vibrant new program on the Elizabeth Campus, Project Centro Hispanico the Hispanic Support Center, is providing services aimed to help Hispanic students remain in college and set goals for their lives. The program was established to address the work/college conflict that is the number one reason UCC students leave the College (most in their first year). The percentage of those leaving is highest for Hispanic students who face language barriers in addition to the other challenges of juggling family, work and education.

Hispanic students comprise 44.2% of the UCC students in Elizabeth. A fiveyear US Dept. of Education Title V Hispanic Serving Institution grant funds the Center, which offers both academic support resources and career exploration and job development. Center Director Librada Sanchez and her staff (a counselor, three career developers, a tutor and administrative assistant) have created a friendly and welcoming atmosphere in their attractive offices adorned with motivational posters.

Each student benefits from a faculty mentor and a career developer, counseling, tutoring and the support of staff and peers. A keystone of the program is a required "survival course", UCC 101, where students learn information literacy, testtaking strategies, time management, memory skills, career and life plan development, College resources, and critical thinking. It culminates in students presenting a paper about their plans for the future.

The program is already succeeding statistically with an increased retention rate, but no description can take the place of a participant's own words. Following is an excerpt from UCC 101 student Alfredo Velez's essay in the Spring 2004 edition of the *Project Centro Hispanico* newsletter. After testing and interviews, Alfredo chose business administration as his major:

Upon my arrival to college...I did not know what ...I wanted to do with my life... I only had my GED and my values...Not only did I find help for career development, but...I learned a huge amount about college and myself. I learned study skills for academic success...I also found an interest in writing...

The HSC is so effective and helpful because of the wonderful staff it has, always working very hard to meet our needs and never satisfied until they have helped us achieve what we're looking for. One could go there for anything from tutoring to looking for a job, or just to talk...The staff was more than just counselors, professors and mentors. They were more like family to me...

I learned very important aspects about life itself. I learned that one should always be ambitious in life and aim high. Of course, all in its time and taking one step at a time. One should always stay focused no matter what curve ball life throws at you... The Staff of the HSC saw potential in all the students and me. When everyone else just ignored me and looked at me as a nothing with no future, the HSC got me back on my feet and focused. For that I am grateful. No words can explain how thankful I am to have been a part of Project Centro Hispanico...

GRANT FUNDS ADVANCE THE

COLLEGE MISSION. Crafting winning proposals for competitive federal, state and foundation funding enables the College to develop innovative programs, or to expand or extend existing programs that are beyond the scope of the usual operating budgets. In Fiscal Year 2003, UCC received \$1,926,035, and this year, through March 30, \$2,822,049 has been awarded. Director of Resource Development Lisa Ebert coordinates all grant applications from her office at the UCC Foundation. Some programs funded by such grants are: Project ABLE, AmeriCorps, Integrated Civics and Literacy, College for Teens, the LIFE Center, and Project Centro Hispanico.
