## Historic Capital Campaign Nears End and New Elizabeth Building Nears Groundbreaking

The \$7,500,000 Partnership for the Future Endowment & Capital Campaign will come to a very successful conclusion on June 30th! Gifts and pledges will be gratefully accepted until that time. Campaign donors will be recognized in the final campaign report and a fitting celebration will be planned.

UCC's Elizabeth campus on West Jersey St. is literally bursting at the seams! Growing dramatically since opening in 1992, it now serves 6,000+ students, many in rental space throughout Elizabeth. As of the end of March 2006, the public bonds that will pay for the construction of the new Elizabeth campus building had all been sold, enabling plans to move forward to create dramatic improvements for the Elizabeth campus. The projected completion date is Summer 2008, coinciding with the 75th anniversary of the founding of the College.

This \$48.5 million dollar project includes extensive renovation of the existing Lessner Building, and will almost quadruple the capacity of the Elizabeth campus. Plans call for a 132,000 sq. ft building with six levels, boasting a stateof-the-art 21st Century Information Commons, two Faculty/staff Campaign donors Paul

full floors of classrooms, modern meeting and dining facilities and a large lecture hall. One floor will contain an economic development suite to facilitate the location of new businesses into Union County. The UCC/Trinitas School of Nursing will occupy an entire floor.

The equipment and furnishings for the new building will be partially funded through the *Partnership for the Future* Campaign. \$5,000,000 of the campaign

total is earmarked for the UCC Foundation Endowment to provide scholarships.

If a donor requests, there are still many naming possibilities on the Cranford, Elizabeth and Plainfield campuses for gifts of \$500 and up. Some available opportunities are: \$1,500 – lamppost; \$5,000 – Video camera; \$10,000 – modernization of greenhouse; \$50,000 – naming a classroom; \$100,000 – naming a science lab or technol-

ogy classroom; \$250,000 naming a course of study; \$500,000 – naming the Institute for Intensive English; \$1,000,000 – naming a building, either Cranford campus science building or Building 2 on the Plainfield Campus. 
### Congressmen Make a Difference at UCC

Returning to his roots as a community college instructor, Congressman Mike Ferguson, (R, NJ) 7th District, addressed several history and government classes in Cranford on February 22nd. Mr. Ferguson spoke about the value of public service and how each individual can make a difference in the lives of their community through individual acts of kindness, and took questions from students on such far-ranging subjects as the New Jersey ports and the war in Iraq. Following his class, the Congressman visited the newly renovated MacKay Library; thanks to his efforts, the College received a generous \$300,000 grant for furnishings and technology equipment for the library.

Congressman Frank Pallone, Jr. (D, NJ) 6th District, visited the Plainfield campus on March 13th to present a check for \$100,000 to support the UCC College for Teens. This innovative program enhances computer, math and science skills for 13-18 year olds, while also coaching them in college-preparatory and life skills. This second grant through Congressman Pallone has enabled the College to expand the teen program and also to provide educational and career services to their parents. Congressman Pallone expressed his deep interest in youth and education and visited classes to see how the College utilizes technology to enhance education.

### Faculty Focus

Dr. Lawrence D. Hogan Senior Professor of History

After 29 years at UCC, Dr. Lawrence Hogan is still excited about teaching! He speaks of the joy of working with the wide variety of students at Union County College, and also his interaction with senior students in the LIFE (Learning Is ForEver) program. He is the faculty advisor for both the Catholic Youth Organization and the Black Students Heritage Organization, Ra sponsor of the Frederick Douglass Birthday celebrations during Black History month. Larry Hogan has been the Rinspiration for Founders' Day at Union County College and is helping to spearhead the 75th Anniversary celebrations.

Dr. Hogan's own higher education includes a BA from Fairfield University, an MA in European History from the University of Connecticut, and a Ph.D. in American and African-American History from Indiana University. He has also taught at these Universities: Notre Dame, DePauw, Indiana, and Rutgers, and at an Elderhostel at the Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, New York.


Union County College's own Larry Hogan is a nationally known expert on the history of African Americans in baseball, serving as director of "Out of the Shadows", a study sponsored by the National Baseball Hall of Fame and the Office of the Commissioner of Major League Baseball. His photo and memorabilia travel exhibit, Before You Can Say Jackie Robinson: Black Baseball in America in the Era of the Color Line, 1885-1950, is shown across the country. He is executive producer of the documentary, Before You Can Say Jackie Robinson, which has been widely aired on PBS stations.

This year he has been on a seven-city book tour to promote his *Shades of Glory: The Negro Leagues and the Story of African-American Baseball*, published by National Geographic Books in association with the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum. "It is the story of black baseball, from slavery days when it was played on plantations in the pre-Civil War South to the first organized games of the mid-19th century to the glory days of the Negro leagues in the 1920s, '30s and '40s." *Shades of Glory* has received many kudos and is a major contribution to sports history and to American history.

Dr. Hogan served on a special Baseball Hall of Fame committee that met during the past year to select nominees of Negro Leagues luminaries to the Baseball Hall of Fame, and will be in Cooperstown on July 30, 2006 for the induction ceremony.

Dr. Hogan's research has encompassed the immigration history of West Indians who settled in Perth Amboy, the Harlem Renaissance and American Basketball, and African American journalism. His book, *A Black National News Service: The Associated Negro Press and Claude Barnett, 1919 – 1945* was published in 2003. The New Jersey Historical Commission gave him an Award of Recognition for "outstanding service to public knowledge and presentation of the history of New Jersey in 1996.

A fun way to learn history is to sign up for Dr. Hogan's tours in New York City (offered each Spring as one-day Continuing Education classes). Students are treated to a wealth of information imparted in an engaging and accessible way. A longtime Fanwood resident, Larry and his wife Sally are proud of three children and five grandchildren.

Smith Theater.

**FAMILY WEEK AT THE THEATER.** Once again The Theater Project at Union County College participated in the New Jersey Theater Alliance's statewide festival offering free and discounted tickets to children and youth. In March, for ages 4 – 9, The Theater Project offered *Animal Babble/Los Animalitos Chiquitos*, and for ages 12 and up interactive theater with *A Few Steps in a Stranger's Shoes* and also a workshop by award-winning playwright Jewel Seehaus-Fisher on writing a one-act play. On March 13 the winning entries in the Young Playwrights Competition received staged readings by professional actors during the New Artists Showcase.

**UPGRADED BALLFIELD.** Shane Walsh Field in Nomahegan Park, where the UCC Owls baseball team plays home games, has been given a major facelift. It now features dugouts and a batting cage, a grass infield, large scoreboard, lighted flagpole, fiberglass team benches, a new backstop



a new backstop and safety fencing above ground. Invisible to the naked eye are underground state of the art drainage and irrigation systems.



At Commencement 2006 the first class of 12 students were graduated from the Paralegal Studies Program with Associate in Applied Science (AAS) degrees. Begun in 2003 with 22 students, there are now 84 declared majors. Over 150 students have taken a class. either as a major or "just looking". Several students have been placed in internships and others are finding positions as paralegals in the Union County area. A student who graduated in December 2005 received a significant scholarship to St. John's University School of Professional Studies where she will earn a BS degree in Legal Studies.

Linda Spagnola, JD is the dynamic Program
Director who planned the program, wrote the proposal and all 14 syllabi, arranged for the fully ABA-compliant law library in the MacKay Library, and developed an Advisory Committee of area attorneys. Dr. Spagnola is now working on the Initial ABA Approval Report for national recognition of UCC's program.

Next Fall UCC Honors Students will participate in an innovative learning experience – an inter-disciplinary Mock Trial. The paralegals will research and write briefs, journalism majors will cover the "story", psych/soc majors will serve on the jury, communications majors will play attorneys, computer techies will provide graphics and trial evidence, and nursing majors will serve as expert witnesses.

The February 2006 student paper, The Scroll, featured a glowing article about the program and the profession by "Stacey Hazel with help from the Litigation I class". Students attended a Legal Assistant of New Jersey meeting where they learned, among many other things, that paralegals in New Jersey are ranked second highest in national salaries for their profession and that their courses mirror a pre-law program, learning the practical side of the law. ## Bouncing Back to Coach at UCC Cheryl H. Bell '90

When Lady Owls Women's Basketball Coach Cheryl Bell was a sophomore at Union High, her guidance counselor gave her some advice which fortunately she ignored. He told her not to go to college, that she would be better off doing clerical work. She has certainly proved him wrong!

The first person in her family to go to college, she went only so she could play basketball. A "C" student in high school, at UCC she faced a harsh reality. Her coach warned her that she couldn't play unless she got her grades up. "I was so scared I wouldn't play that I worked hard to get good grades and made the Dean's List several times." She graduated with an AA degree in Early Childhood Education in 1990, then with a BA in Psychology from William Paterson University in 1993 and a Master's in Physical Education with a concentration in Coaching and Sports Administration in 2004 from Montclair State University. Her many athletic achievements are too numerous to detail here.

As player and co-captain of the Lady Owls in 1989-1990, Cheryl Bell averaged 12 points per game and was nominated to the 1st team All-Garden State Athletic Conference and 2nd Team All Region XIX. The team was ranked fifth in the

nation for defense. "When I was at UCC, I played with two phenomenal all-Americans, Nancy Foster and Shirlynn Shirley. I learned about the game defensively and about half of my points were from steals. As they say, 'Offense wins games, but defense wins championships."

When she returned as assistant Lady Owls coach from 1994 -1999 she recruited and developed guard and point players, helped develop the lifting and conditioning program and was instrumental in defensive game tactics. She saw the Lady Owls win seven Titles and play in two NJCAA, Division II, Tournaments.

After three years as assistant coach at Caldwell College, she returned to her first alma mater in May 2004 as Head Coach of the Lady Owls. Also in 2004 she was inducted into the UCC Athletic Hall of Fame. Coach Bell is determined to bring the Lady Owls a championship under her leadership.

Cheryl's inspiration is her mother, who raised seven children on her own. Although she herself has no children of her own, her players look up to her as a mother figure, friend and counselor. "I've had girls become very upset because I'm hard on them regarding their grades. They think that

getting a C is OK and it's not. I want them to work hard. Coaching is so much more than just X's and O's. You have to understand human behavior and what's really going on."

Asked if she is more passionate about coaching or playing, she replies, "At this stage of my life, it's coaching. But I really love to play too. I guess it's a tie. I want these girls to learn some good habits they can carry with them after basketball. There will be hard times but I want them to overcome challenges. At games and practices you'll hear me yelling, 'Where's your snap back ability?"" In addition to her coaching duties at UCC, this dynamo teaches Health & Physical Education at Science High School in Newark, New Jersey. Coach Bell has earned the respect of her students while instilling determination and a positive outlook not only about the sport but about life. U
