UCC Awarded \$1.9 Million Grant To Advance *Healthcare Careers*

The U.S. Department of Labor announced recently that Union County College has been selected from among a highly competitive field to receive a \$1.9 million grant over three years to provide expanded educational programs and resources for educating practical nurses and other healthcare workers – one of only two such grants awarded in New Jersey.

In commending the UCC team that developed the project, *Building A Pathway to Healthcare Careers*, UCC President Dr.Thomas H. Brown noted that, "This new initiative responds to the region's growing shortage of healthcare workers in new and innovative ways."

This prestigious national grant will support the training of frontline health workers, such as emergency medical technicians, the purchase of state-of-the-art equipment that will benefit students pursuing healthcare careers at UCC, and expansion of the practical nursing program through new evening and weekend course offerings.

According to Patricia Castaldi, MSN, RN, Director of UCC's Practical Nursing Program and Project Director of this new initiative, "This is a very exciting grant that will also

provide important resources for recruitment, retention, tutoring and career counseling. It will better enable our students to meet the growing challenges of today's healthcare industry." The grant will also support increased outreach to high school students and other populations to encourage pursuit of postsecondary training in healthcare careers.

In announcing the grant, Senator Frank R. Lautenberg stated, "These funds will help Union County College ... provide training for students to become nurses – and to better keep families healthy in New Jersey." In congratulating the College, Senator Robert Menendez commented that the grant will help to "develop nurses who are at the forefront of caring for those who are sick or injured."

Creating a Scholarship Endowment Fund With a Bequest



This excerpt from a "thank you" letter by a scholarship recipient to her benefactor gives an idea how much this kind of help can mean to struggling students:

"My major is visual art ... I will be pursuing my goal to become a graphic designer... I am an independent student, and my financial situation has been very tough. In addition to going to school full time, I have also been working full time. For a few years, managing my time and balancing my finances has been a big challenge. However, your generous support has helped me significantly.

Not only have you given me a tremendous financial support, but also your support has provided enormous emotional support. When I'm having trouble with my school work, I always tell myself that I have a sponsor who believes in me. I am so happy to know that there is somebody who cares about me. Thank you so much for your confidence in me."

Focus on Faculty



Associate Professor Barbara Foley

Still Loving It After All These Years!

Professor Barbara Foley was the first full-time faculty member Dr. Helen Aron hired in 1973 when UCC was starting the English as a Second Language (ESL) program. Although a coup in Libya had prevented her and her husband Bill from going overseas with the Peace Corps, she found her true calling as an ESL teacher during the excellent Peace Corps training. Her BA is from Marywood College and MA from Rutgers University. The young teacher came to Union College from the Plainfield schools, where she had set up their first ESL program.

UCC's fledgling program had about 200 students and met in a multi-purpose building in the Bayway area, providing four levels of ESL. At that time there were many Cuban students. The ESL student

population evolves with changes in political and economic situations in the world. At one time there were many Russian students, then Vietnamese. Now the largest numbers are Colombian, Polish, Haitian and Peruvian.

Professor Foley is a respected author of textbooks, published by the premier name in ESL publishing. Her two listening textbooks, *Listen to Me* and *Now Hear This*, are both very popular. However, she is best known for her four-text series, *Grammar in Action*, which became an international best seller. Because of this, she is often approached to give presentations at meetings and conferences.

Prof. Foley spends twelve hours a week with her Levels 1 - 4 classes. Teaching ESL requires creative activities that push the students to talk to each other and to interact as they practice their English. Students study together and help one another, which has even led to some romances. The students are fascinated to learn about the varied customs of their fellow students' countries, as well as of the USA. (For instance, some expressed amazement about the fact that Americans obey traffic laws!)

It's clear that this born teacher loves her job. "I love going to work each morn-

ing! I feel blessed and love teaching these students for whom I have enormous respect and admiration. Teaching them is a delight." She explains that it is very difficult to learn a new language well enough to immerse oneself in a foreign culture and become fluent in a new language and comfortable with a new society.

Because she saw firsthand how difficult it is for many students who work full or part-time at low paying jobs, often while raising children, to afford tuition, in 2000 she established the *Barbara Foley Scholarship Fund*, and in 2004 she began a second scholarship endowment to benefit financially needy ESL students who are doing well.

Dr. Helen Aron, retired Director of the Institute for Intensive English, readily praises her former colleague: "Barbara is an innovative, creative professor. She tries out all the ideas that appear in her textbooks in her classes on the Elizabeth campus. Her UCC students get the benefit not only of her creativity but also of her years of experience."

Prof. Foley and her husband William Foley, retired superintendent of the Westfield public schools, raised their children, Sean, Tom, and Megan, in Westfield and now have three grandchildren. Her students helped to repay her devotion to them in March when they agreed to have classes through spring break so that she would be free to visit her daughter and new grandson the following week. foley@ucc.edu


