### Alum's passion for art becomes a new career

After 25 years of practicing health care law, attorney Theodosia A. Tamborlane '08 wanted to try something new. So in 2005, she decided to take art lessons and what was supposed to be only a hobby developed into a new career.

Theo's art teacher saw in her work a genuine gift and advised her to come to UCC. "When growing up and as an adult, I was never in an environment where art and painting were present...Art wasn't there," she said. At UCC, Theo found her passion as an artist, preferring to work on her art projects than her legal cases.

In 2008, Theo graduated from UCC with a degree in Fine Arts. Although she struggled for a long time to find the balance between her law career and her love of art, she now defines herself as a full-time artist that sometimes practices a little law. She has a studio in her home and spends most of her time painting and exhibiting her artwork in New York and New Jersey.

She usually works with oils on paper and canvas, but also has made some collages. One of her most memorable compositions was entitled "Lifetimes," which represented three different lives. Each "Lifetime" is presented by a series of ten canvases; each canvas a possible decade of a person's life. Her intent was to invoke the feeling of movement from birth to death.

In the short time since she took up art, Theo has received wide-spread recognition and honors for her incredible talent. Her degree from UCC has brought her credibility as an artist and helped her succeed in the art world.

In addition to her careers as an artist and a lawyer, Theo has an active family life. She is a dedicated wife, mother of three, and proud grandmother to five grandchildren. Her biggest supporters, her family, are constantly amazed by her talent and how she developed it into a second career.

Theo's work was part of the Contemporary Art Group displayed at The Artist Framer Gallery from April 2nd to May 1st. Her art was also featured at the 2nd Annual Art Show to Stock the Food Pantry at JFS at the L&M Art Gallery in Elizabeth, NJ on Sunday, April 18th.

# UCC Provided Assistance Haitian Family Resource Center

In February, the New Jersey Department of Human Services opened the "New Jersey Haitian Family Resource Center" on the lower level of the Sidney Lessner Building of Union County College's Elizabeth campus. The Resource Center provided vital services for the members of the Haitian community affected by the earthquake that devastated Port-au-Prince on January 12. The City of Elizabeth is home to a large Haitian community and the campus was easily accessible, by public transportation.

"The College has been actively working to support our Haitian students and the members of the New Jersey Haitian community. When the Union County and State officials approached the College about establishing the Resource Center on our Elizabeth campus, we knew it was the next step in providing support to those in need," said Victor M. Richel, Chair of the UCC Board of Trustees.

At the Center, a number of support services were available to the Haitian-Americans and Haitian nationals living in New Jersey, including: interpretation services; assistance with immigration-related issues; family assistance applications; access to telephones and computers to obtain more information about those in their homeland; child custody matters; legal information; and grief counseling.

"The College was happy to provide its facility to those agencies that continue to assist Haitian families in the aftermath of this tragedy in their homeland," said Dr. John R. Farrell, Jr., Interim President of Union County College. "Approximately 550 people were helped."

The Resource Center was staffed by a wide range of State, Union County, and other agencies that had access to vital and reliable information. State, city and local agencies that provided support included: NJ Department of Human Services Office of Emergency Management, NJ Department of Health and Senior Services, NJ Office of Homeland Security and Preparedness, American Red Cross, Salvation Army, the Emergency Management section of the New Jersey State Police Homeland Security Branch, Union County Department of Human Services, NJ Department of Children and Family Services, U.S. Citizens and Immigration Services, the faith-based community and NJ4Haiti.

The archive will be a valuable research tool for both for the faculty and the students," said Dr. Brown.

With the completion of the Elizabeth I. Kellogg Building in Elizabeth and departments relocating to the new building, space was finally available on the

Cranford Campus to house the archival collection. Dr. Brown, funding the project himself, retrofitted part of the Foundation House to be the new home of the UCC Archive.

Over the past five months, he, with the help his assistant, Camille Cormier, has sorted through millions of pages of documents, newspaper and magazine articles, books and catalogs, as well as memorabilia from the founding of Union County Junior College in 1933 to today. All of the historical material has to be cataloged and organized so that it can be easily accessed in the future.

Eventually the archive will be open to the public (by appointment). Visitors will be able to view memorabilia on display, including an original Ucev Juicy cheerleading uniform from the 1950's, yearbooks going back to the 1940's and photographs from the College's 76 year history.

Dr. Brown will also be using the archival material to complete a book about the last 20 years at UCC. During that time period, the College grew over 60 percent, underwent \$120 million in capital construction and evolved from a suburban based school to an urban school.
