## Gifts of Art - the UCC Foundation Art Collection

Art enriches the life of all who study, work or visit Union County College's campuses in Cranford, Elizabeth and Plainfield. A wide array of artwork is on permanent display. Alumna and UCC Foundation trustee Suzanne Skillin Covine '58 knows every item in the collection. As the enthusiastic Chair of the Foundation's Artwork Committee, she has spearheaded the cataloguing, appraising, and inventory of art belonging to the Foundation.

Generous College friends over the years have donated paintings, prints and sculptures, and continue to do so. Earlier this year UCC Foundation Trustee and art collector John Jacobson and his wife Josephine donated six beautiful signed prints to the UCC Foundation: a Robert Rauschenberg serigraph and five lithographs by the early 20th century avant-garde Russian artists Wasily Kandinsky and Kasimir Malevich.

One of the most valuable art objects is the iron owl sculpture of the late artist Harry Devlin's "Icarus", which hangs in the Cranford Commons. It was manufactured in 1963 in the Elizabeth foundry run by the late Dorothy Gasorek '44, and funded by Junior Achievement of Union and Middlesex Counties.

The walls of the Roy W. Smith Theater in Cranford are adorned by four impressive large paintings by Porfirio DiDonna (Untitled), Michael Gallagher (Glimpses of the Moon), George Green (Christian Charmer), and Richard Saba (Green Child). The appraised value of the collection now stands at over \$343,843. 
# A Psychic and Holistic Adventure at UCC

# READ OWL ABOUT IT

MEN'S SOCCER TEAM 3<sup>RD</sup> IN NATION. In November, the UCC Soccer Team appeared in the Final Four of Division III Soccer for the second year in a row. No other team in UCC's 71 year history has advanced this far

in national tournament playoffs. The Owls are Region XIX and District 4 Champions. Coach Alex Louis has been named Region XIX Coach of the Year, repeating last year's title.

**ELECTION YEAR AT UCC**. College President and historian Dr. Thomas H. Brown donated a collection of 126 political campaign buttons to the UCC Library. As a condition of the gift, the Library agreed to mount a display of election memorabilia every four years during the Presidential election. A voter registration drive by many enthusiastic faculty/staff volunteers resulted in registering 556 new voters.

#### A NEW TEAM AT UCC - LADY OWLS VOLLEYBALL.

Formed this Fall and coached by Mario Caruso, the team won their very first game in October. UCC hopes to put a varsity team in the National Junior College Athletic Association next year.

HANDS ACROSS THE SEAS. In response to the March 11<sup>th</sup> terrorist attacks in Madrid, Spain, Prof. Regina Siemoneit, Psychology, and her students began "The Spain Project". They collected 400 pages of messages of sympathy and support from the College community. The book presented to Ambassador Juan Egea at the Spanish Consulate in New York City featured a wood cover with a quote from Sartre – *The only truly dead are those who have been forgotten*. Prof. Siemoneit and student Raquel Danes, who is from Spain, were featured in *The Star-Ledger* in September.

**CHANGE FOR ENDOWED SCHOLARSHIPS.** The UCC Foundation Board of Trustees has increased the minimum gift for establishing new endowed scholarship funds from \$10,000 to \$15,000. 
