UCC Can Celebrate a Successful Capital Campaign – the Largest of Any Community College in New Jersey

Turn this newsletter over and you'll note the motto of the Union County College Foundation – "We make dreams come true". For hundreds of students each year, the path to the dream of a higher education is created through a UCCF scholarship. However, for hundreds more, this dream has been out of reach.

On December 31, 2006, the Foundation and the College successfully concluded the largest capital campaign in the history of New Jersey community colleges. The *Partnership for* the Future Endowment and Capital Campaign, with a goal of \$7,500,000, achieved gifts and pledges totaling over \$8,000,000. Of this amount, over \$5,000,000 will create a permanent endowment, the income from which will be awarded forever as scholarships.

Over the past two years, *About Union* has shared some of the highlights of the Campaign. With this report, we are thrilled to announce that, in gratitude for the lead gift of her family, the new Elizabeth campus building shall be named in memory of Elizabeth I. Kellogg. The Kellogg family has, for many years, supported the students and programs of Union County College. Hundreds of donors joined with them to assure the success of this historic campaign.

Thanks to all those who contributed to the *Partnership for the Future* Campaign, the Union County College Foundation will continue to keep its promise to "make dreams come true" for current and future generations of students.

HISPANIC HERITAGE MONTH. A "Latino Artists of Plainfield" exhibit graced the Plainfield campus in October. Cosponsors were the Plainfield Cultural and Heritage Commission and the SGA.

NEW NAME FOR STUDENT RESOURCE CENTER. In October the Hispanic Support Center was rededicated and renamed the Center for Student Success / Centro de Excelencia Estudiantil. The Center's mission is to empower all students through education to ensure a successful career. Omayra Arocho is the Center Director. Perhaps in your time at UCC you had occasion to enjoy or even be a part of helping to create a feature that makes Union County College unique – the Peace Garden that flowers in the courtyard between the Nomahegan classroom building, the Humanities Building and the MacKay Library and provides a green haven for students, faculty and staff.

It was created in 1981 by a small group of dedicated students (Winifred Quinn, Monica Shimkus and Alan Pucciariello) and Faculty Advisor English Professor Vicki Reback, who were trying to find a tangible way to make the world a little better. So they planted a small vegetable garden and read *Carrots Love Tomatoes*. Over the years as the number of caretakers grew, so the Garden also grew in size and beauty, till this day it fills the courtyard as a lovely flowering space with a gazebo and picnic benches, and even an outdoor classroom space for lovely days.

Over the years as student interests grew and the physical space expanded, the Garden became a Club and morphed into a Social Action and Environmental Awareness Organization with a growing physical home at its heart. Students could get their hands dirty and fill their minds with interesting projects at the same time.

It was a kind of intentional community within the College for many students who may remember working on bringing recycling to campus and having Earth Day Teach-Ins, and sponsoring poet Allen Ginsberg, folk singer Holly Near, environmental philosopher David Abram, and The Peace Weavers with their Native American Talking Stick Circles. They may remember pulling weeds and planting flowers and putting down walkways to define the space. The Garden sponsored a Tibetan Monk who spent a week constructing and deconstructing a sand mandala in the Commons as a Meditation on Life and Death, while in the Garden life began to bloom anew.

Such events brought the role of the Garden into the fuller life of the College as into the hearts of all who had the opportunity to participate in growing the Peace Site that it has been for many years with the Peace Pole in four languages planted at its center. In 1981 the late Lou Kousin, an adult UCC student, began the Peace Site Movement through what is now New Jersey Peace Action and helped to establish 734 sites across the country. UCC's Peace Garden Site was an early one in New Jersey.

When the Twin Towers fell, many found comfort being in the Garden amidst living things. And in all seasons, whether one is meeting friends or reading a book in the shade of a tree on one of the many benches, the Garden is one of few green spaces at the Cranford campus in which the natural world can be enjoyed. These days the Peace Garden is cared for in all seasons by former Volunteer Master Gardener Anna Ferrara. Many people make a trip to the Garden just to ask her advice or share in the beauty she has helped to nurture.

Now the Peace Garden needs some friends! Due to budgetary constraints, funding for the ongoing care of the Garden has run out. A committee is being formed to raise at least \$60,000 for a Peace Garden Endowment Fund. John Bush '86, who helped to lay down the pathways with the Garden Club, will chair this fund raising effort.

Alumni Profiles

Josephine M. (Tropeano) Varga '87

"Living With a Disability in a World That Has Little Patience for Imperfection"

Josie had a big self-esteem problem from being taunted and made to feel different all her life because of cerebral palsy and a severe bilateral hearing loss.

From the age of five she had wanted to be a writer. She got the push she needed at UCC in Professor Susan Stock's English class when her teacher praised her essay about teen suicide, read from it to the class, and recruited her on the spot to write for the *Scroll*. Later when she got notes from fellow students telling her how helpful her stories were, she was hooked. She says she will always be grateful to UCC for the encouragement and the good education she got here.

After UCC, she graduated in 1988

from Glassboro State College (now Rowan University) with a BA in Communications with a specialization in Journalism. After several discouraging experiences of losing out on jobs because of clear-cut discrimination, she joined the National Association of Fleet Administrators, beginning as assistant editor and ending as director of communications and editor.

She left there to become a communications consultant and writer. Josie's attitude is that it's important to try, to let go of negativity and not have to wonder in later life, "what if?". Her first book, a memoir of the lessons life has taught her, was published in 2004 – *Footprints in the Sand. A Disabled Woman's*



Inspiring Journey to Happiness. She is seek-

ing a literary agent for her five children's picture books and working on a second book, 101 Ways to Nourish Your Spirit. A true creative spirit, she has patents for two products and a copyright for a reality show treatment which she is promoting.

Life gave her many challenges, including a serious skin cancer and a high risk pregnancy, but also a happy home in Westfield with her husband John, a computer engineer with Bank of America, and her "miracles" - sevenyear old Erica and five-year old Lia. www.josievarga.com josievarga@comcast.net.

Winifred V. Quinn, Ph.D. '86

A self-confessed "terrible student in K-12", Winifred Quinn came to UCC and says she "just blossomed" and "learned how to love to learn". She especially credits Professor Vicki Reback's "Banned Books" class and the Garden Club for being important to her development. Before she graduated in 1982 she helped to plant what became the Peace Garden and to found the Garden Club. She's still involved as a member of the Peace Garden Endowment committee.

She took the spirit of community service and desire to make the world a better place from her Garden Club days at UCC to earn three more degrees and to thrive in a stellar career of public service. Her BS in Health and Physical Education with a Therapeutic Recreation option was earned at Douglass College, Rutgers in 1986, and followed by an MA in Counseling, Human Development and Educational Leadership from Monmouth State U. in 1997.

Then in May 2006 she marched at

Rutgers U. again, for her Ph.D. in Health Communication. She used this occasion to start the *Anne E. & James T. Quinn Memorial Scholarship Fund* in memory of her parents, for students with an interest in gerontology.

Dr. Quinn's work life has had great variety from being a therapeutic recreation specialist, an expediter in gourmet restaurants in San Francisco, a community educator on alcohol abuse, and a health and wellness educator. As a research assistant and research analyst at the Rutgers Center for State Health Policy she came to appreciate the role of public policy in helping people. She became Assistant State Director -Advocacy for AARP, New Jersey in 2005. She is proud of her work in convening AARP NJ's Summits on longterm care in 2005 and 2006, and in successfully lobbying for a "global budget" pilot project and for the passage of the "Independence, Dignity & Choice in Long-Term Care Act", which was signed by the Governor at the 2006 event.



Now New Jerseyans are fortunate to have this UCC alumna helping to protect the rights and dignity of the elderly in her new role as the Senior

Policy Advisor in the Division of Elder Advocacy in the new Department of the Public Advocate in Trenton. This is a principal executive department of the state "dedicated to making government more accountable and more responsive to the needs of average New Jerseyans", to "provide a voice to the voiceless".
