Union's Alumni Help Turn Around Lives

Union County College's new executive director for the Foundation has a message for Alumni: "We love you, we need you, and we'll always keep the light on for you."

oug Rouse joined the College Foundation on Nov. 10 and has said that connecting with College Alumni is a top priority. "Alumni have so much to offer Union County College and our students. They're a living legacy for the College. They are our goodwill ambassadors throughout the community, the region, the State and the nation."

Mr. Rouse says he has been pleased to find that Union's Alumni are deeply committed to the success of students and the College. "I have been impressed to find so many of our Alumni who are generously donating their time, talent, and treasure to the College."

On the subject of "time," Mr. Rouse credits the Alumni Board for its efforts to raise the profile of the Association. "We are fortunate to have a small but highly dedicated Board that cares a great deal about the College. They work tirelessly to attract new members—and certainly we can always use more members."

One of the ways the Association tries to boost membership is by hosting special events like the recent Jazz concert and

Louis Armstrong symposium. The Oct. 5 show in the Roy Smith Theater attracted more than 200 Alumni as well as current students.

Regarding "talent," with more than a million people having attended Union over the past 82 years, College Alumni have built successful careers in virtually every industry across the planet. Some have returned to the College to teach. Others stop by on occasion for a presentation or workshop. For example, best-selling author and '99 graduate Jamie Novak visits the College on occasion to share her insights on how to live a clutter-free life.

Mr. Rouse feels that Alumni provide a great deal of value as role models for current students. "The success our Alumni achieved after graduating is an inspiration for current or future generations of students."

The third way that Alumni contribute is through "treasure." Alumni are among the Foundation's most generous donors. Says Mr. Rouse, "Donations by our Alumni provide scholarships for dozens of students in our community. Three of the College's top ten donors are Alumni. They are truly making a real difference in their lives and helping end the circle of poverty."

Mr. Rouse cites three ways Alumni are giving back to their alma mater. A contribution of at least \$25,000 creates an endowed scholarship that generates 5 percent in tuition support for students annually, and forever. Individual Alumni have created seven of these scholarships. This includes an endowed scholarship that the Alumni Association funded to support parttime students.

The second is an annual scholarship, which the donor replenishes each year. Alumni fund a number of these as well. Last year, the Alumni Association created the "Alumni Scholarship for Degree Completion" to give students a financial boost during their last semester before graduation.


donate money to support students is in their participation in Foundation scholarship fundraisers. These are the Scholarship Gala, most recently held on Nov. 7 at the Galloping Hill Country Club in Kenilworth, and the Scholarship Golf Outing, held every April at Echo Lake Country Club in Westfield.

This year's 22nd Annual Gala and 22nd Annual Golf Outing raised a combined \$310,000 in net revenue. In human terms, this would provide full-semester scholarships for at least 200 students.

Mr. Rouse points out that Alumni don't just make financial contributions to these chief fundraisers. "They also volunteer their time and talent to serving on committees to manage these events from planning to working throughout the event."

Mr. Rouse's message to all of the Alumni contributors: "Thank you so much for your generous support and commitment to the College's mission of "transforming our community, one student at a time."

A Historic Find in a Cornerstone

In the midst of demolition to prepare for constructing Cranford's Student Services building, the contractor removed a section of the Nomahegan building that included the cornerstone—and made an amazing discovery. Buried within a nook of the granite base was a veritable treasure trove of College memorabilia, circa 1959, which was when the Nomahegan building was constructed.

Highlights of the historic find include a reel containing an audio recording of a Government 202 class that Saul Orkin—then instructor, but the College's future president—taught on Apr. 23, 1959. The repository also featured period newspapers ranging from the New York Times to the Cranford Chronicle as well as a representative array of Union Junior College brochures and bulletins and catalogs and newsletters.

One of the more fascinating finds is the April 1957 Report for Union Junior College "by the evaluation team of the Middle States Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools." Then there is a stack of black and white pictures that the College began featuring this month on the Union Web site in celebration of our Oct. 16, 1933, Founder's Day.

Along with the photographs and about 30 printed documents, the collection includes three mysterious rocks.

The Alumni Association has claimed the box of historic artifacts. Any Association member wishing to check out this discovery—and even Xerox anything you find interesting—is welcome to visit the Alumni Office in the Cranford Campus Foundation House. Call 908-709-7506 to schedule a visit.
