MARY ZIMMERMANN RECEIVED LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

Congratulations to Board of Trustees Vice Chair Mary M. Zimmermann, Union '01, who received the 2019 Women of Excellence Lifetime Achievement Award from the Union County Commission on the Status of Women. She was chosen for this award due to her outstanding contributions to the Union County community.

On March 29, at the annual Women of Excellence Gala Awards Dinner, Mrs. Zimmermann was presented the award by Union's Associate Professor of Chemistry Sherry Heidary who serves on the Advisory Board for the Commission on the Status of Women.

Mrs. Zimmermann is a steadfast advocate for the needs of Union students and the College. She been a member of the College's Board of Trustees for more than a decade, serves on the College's Board of Governors, and is a member and prior Chair of the Union County College Foundation Board. Her advocacy for the College expands beyond her role on the Boards. She is Vice Chair of the New Jersey Council of County Colleges (NJCCC) and serves as the Board's liaison to NJCCC. On a national level, Mrs. Zimmermann serves on the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Committee of the Association of Community College Trustees (ACCT) and regularly represents the College at ACCT events.

Mrs. Zimmermann is a self-described professional volunteer. She has been an active member of SAGE Eldercare's "Meal on Wheels" program and the "Loaves and Fishes" Food Pantry at St. Teresa of Avila Church. She is one of five commissioners for the Summit Housing Authority, which assists with affordable housing for low income residents of Summit. She also finds time to assist the United Way of Summit. She works tirelessly to improve the lives of Union County residents.

UNION COUNTY COLLEGE FOUNDATION PROVIDES \$1.1 MILLION IN STUDENT SCHOLARSHIPS



The Union County College Foundation held their annual Scholarship Reception for donors to meet the recipients of their scholarships. More than \$1.1 million in support was distributed this year and scholarships were issued to more than 700 students. Approximately 225 guests were present to celebrate the occasion between students and donors.

J. Anthony Manager, Esq., Chair of the Union County College Foundation Board and a member of the College's Board of Governors, welcomed the attendees and thanked everyone for their support. This year, the Foundation announced that 14 new scholarships were created to support Union students. Student speaker Raquel Costa, a member of the class of 2020 from Union Township, addressed the audience and spoke about how her life has been transformed thanks to the financial support. She stated, "When I first received my scholarship, I thought it just meant not having to worry about money, but after some time, after becoming immersed in my college community, I've seen that it means so much more. It opens so many more doors than just the financial ones. Thank you, from the bottom of my heart for allowing me to have a meaningful college experience, one filled with knowledge and happiness and memories to last a lifetime."

Congratulations to women's basketball players Yamel Abreu, of Union, and Jessica Woods, of Linden, who were both named 2019 Division II First Team All-American by the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA). This distinction follows their incredible performances this year which led the women's basketball team to end their season ranked second in the nation.

Yamel, a guard/forward for Union, had a fantastic season. For a second year, she was chosen as the NJCAA Region XIX Player of the Year. During the season, she surpassed her 1000th point mark and led the team in scoring with an average of 16.7 points per game. Ms. Woods grabbed her 500th career rebound and averaged a double-double with 14.3 points and 11.7 rebounds per game.


INFORMING HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS ABOUT THE VALUE OF UNION
