UNION AND KITAMI INSTITUTE OF JAPAN SIGNED A MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT

President McMenamin and Dr. Soichiro Suzuki, President of the Kitami Institute of Technology of Japan, signed a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) on the College's Elizabeth Campus on Oct. 22. The two institutions will participate in an exchange of students and faculty, collaborate on research initiatives, establish joint education programs and grant activities, and exchange academic materials and continuing education opportunities. Fourteen members of the Kitami Institute were present for the occasion and were joined by members of the College's faculty, staff, and students. Following the signing ceremony, the Japanese delegation toured the Elizabeth campus. Led by Dean of Elizabeth Campus Dr. Lester Sandres Rápalo, this agreement continues the efforts to internationalize the College. The agreement marks the 50th Anniversary of the Sister City Partnership between Elizabeth and Kitami.

One topic covered was hate being a learned behavior and that a better job needs to be done to teach young children to love and not hate. The panel also addressed the proliferation of hate speech on the internet and protecting speech, including hate speech, under the First Amendment.
