

DR. KANTER SPOKE ABOUT THE COLLEGE PROMISE CAMPAIGN AT CONVOCATION

Dr. Martha J. Kanter, Executive Director of the College Promise Campaign and former U.S. Under Secretary of Education from 2009-2013 under President Obama, was the keynote speaker at Convocation held on Sept. 3 at the Cranford campus. She presented, "Making and Keeping the College Promise: One Community at a Time." The Campaign is a national initiative to increase college access, affordability, quality, and completion in higher education, and most specifically in community colleges. Dr. Kanter praised the College community for the work being done in initiatives like Operation Graduation and Project Achievement. The success of these initiatives is most evident through the significant increase in graduation rates from 5.9% in 2009 to 29.7% in 2018.

In addition to her current position, Dr. Kanter is a Senior Fellow at New York University's Steinhardt Institute for Higher Education Policy. In her role as the U.S. Under Secretary of Education, she oversaw all federal postsecondary statutory, regulatory, and administrative policies and programs, including the \$175B annual federal student aid programs, higher education, adult education, career-technical education, international education, and 6 White House Initiatives. From 1993-2009, she was president of De Anza College and then chancellor of Foothill-De Anza Community College District in Silicon Valley, California. Dr. Kanter holds a B.A. in sociology from Brandeis University, an M.Ed. from Harvard University, and an Ed.D. from the University of San Francisco.

He was joined by Close the Gap supporter Assemblywoman Linda Carter. Freeholder Vice Chairman Alexander Mirabella was joined by Freeholders Andrea Staten and Angela Garretson and presented Mr. Bolden with a resolution that outlined his many accomplishments in addition to his generous support of Union County College.

Entertainment was provided by two singers, one of Venezuelan heritage and one of Salvadoran heritage.

STUDENTS MET THE DEANS AT THE "DEAN'S SCOOP"

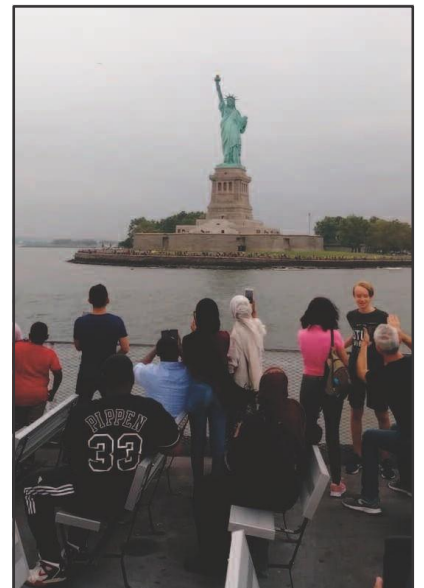

The cost is included as part of the course fees and allows students to save hundreds of dollars annually. Cengage is the largest U.S.-based education and technology company serving the higher education markets. They provide course materials to almost half of the 20 million higher education students across the country.

During the summer, members of the College's faculty learned how to use the new technology and adapted their courses to the current materials available through Cengage.
